Mr. James Keillor signed up to speak to the council in reference to the upcoming water & sewer rate changes scheduled for March 2019. Mr. Keillor stated the in 2005 the city contracted a firm

from Dallas for a \$30,000 program to estimate our rated for the next 10 years. The firm gave the city a 10 year program where the rates would go up every year and the city followed it. In 2015 it terminated and left a year gap and in 2016 the city re-contracted with the same group for what he believes was another \$30,000 to tell the city what the water rates should be. Mr. Keillor continued that in January two years ago the firm presented their brochure all of the council at that time received a nice costly folder with a nice spiral binder and the bill. Mr. Keillor stated that the bottom line was that they projected that the city would spend \$14.5 million over the next 10 years in capital expenditures and the suggested what the water rates needed to be. Mr. Keillior stated that the information they used to project that was given by the city and about \$10 million was good faith estimates of legitimate projects for expansion of the sewer plant, water plant, lift stations etc. Mr. Keillor believes there was about \$4.5 million of fluff as replacement of water and sewer lines which there was no study done or evidence for need of replacement. Mr. Keillor stated that at the time he objected to the new rate increases and that Mr. Milum had looked at it very carefully. Mr. Keillior explained that if the city were to graph the firm Willdan and put in on a 45 degree line Mr. Milum gave a counter proposal Mr. Keillor believes about a 20 to 25 degree line which would reduce the rate increase and instead of increasing every year over a ten year period its suggested the city increase every other year so there would be five increases. Mr. Keillor stated that was the history of it. That was in January 2017 and was implemented in March and we will be facing a rate increase in March of this year. Mr. Keillor stated that currently water is \$23.91 for the first 2,000 gallons and will increase to \$29.64 a \$5.73 increase. The rate from 2,000 to 10,000 is going from \$4.20 to \$4.50 \$.30 a thousand. Mr. Keillor explained that for a family that uses sewer the base rate would increase \$1.04 for the first 2,000 \$.17 per thousand gallon. For a family that uses 10,000 which would be a family of four that is 300 gallons a day over 10,000 a month this would mean \$8.13 in water \$2.40 in sewer and a \$10.53 increase. For the average consumption in the city which Mr. Keillor believes is extremely low is between 5,000-6,000 gallons for a 5,000 gallon consumption the increase would be from \$75.49 to \$83.67 that would be \$8.18 which is just short of an 11% increase.

Mr. Keillor stated that his question to the council was that the compromise was far and generous it brought down the projected rates from the \$30,000 consultants substantially. He is asking the city before the rates are raised again to look at it very seriously look at the expenditures, look at the income and if income exceeds expenditures by 5% which should be sufficient enough cushion for contingencies. He would hope that the council would say rates don't need to be raised again. He believes if the city doesn't need to raise the rates they should freeze them where they are. If the city finds that income is 10% to 15% greater then expenditures maybe the city could look and a 5% to 10% rollback and if there is a capital improvement that's projected for this year the city may need to raise their water and sewer rates.

Mr. Keillor stated that Los Fresnos has the highest rates in the area and asked the council to reconsider the rates. He feels that the city needs to look at their cost before the March deadline comes to raise the water and sewer rates.

Councilmember James Herrera asked if he could make a comment to Mayor Narvaez. Mr. Herrera commented that the council to consider what Mr. Keillor had said and any time a rate increase should be done the city should do their own internal study.

Mayor Narvaez agreed.

Mr. Milum explained to the public that last month the council approved bids for drainage improvements through a TxCDBG grant . Mayor Narvaez read the action item and asked Mr. Keillor if this was the item he would like to make a comment on. Mr. Keillor answered yes him and several others would like to make comments on the item. It was placed as an action item so there could be a dialogue the public could speak and the council or Mr. Milum could respond. Mr. Keillor said he appreciated that and he was looking for a dialogue and he would begin. Mr. Milum stated it should be limited. Mayor Narvaez asked it be timed because there was a long agenda and would still need to go into closed session but for Mr. Keillor to go ahead and then asked how many people would speak. Mr. Keillor responded three.

Mr. Keillor began by stated that they were all residents of Henderson Rd. it's been an issue that has existed for 30 years. He stated that about 30 years ago there was a death on one end about three years ago there was a death on another crossing. The second one brought a little more light to the issue. The initial response was that we had to broaden or widen these crossings even from time to time there has been deterioration of the existing road especially on the east end. Mr. Keillor believes the crossings need to be widen for vehicular traffic the goal is to get the project going. Personally Mr. Keillor believes that he would like to see the goal of the city to start in June. June, July and August gives the city a three month window where traffic to and from the school is at a minimal. He hope that in the next five months he can see the project get underway this year.

6:00 PM

Mr. Keillor explained to the Mayor that if he remembered two years ago in January he was at the council meeting and that he said that the city really needs to look at two phases of the project. The city had been focusing on vehicular traffic crossing the Resaca's. Mr. Keillor stated he had been talking to Mark at the time about students walking along the road. Mr. Keillor felt at the time there needed to be two lanes a guardrail and a least a decent side walk on one side for pedestrian traffic. Two years age Mr. Keillor raised the fact that the city needs to go beyond the two crossings and see if the city could expand the scope of the project to pedestrian traffic. Mr. Keillor stated that at the time he encouraged the city to expand the program to include a resolution for pedestrian traffic from Paredes Line Rd. to Old Alice Rd. He spoke to Mark and Mark said there had been no expansion of that at that point. Mr. Keillor asked Mr. Milum if that was correct. Mr. Milum answered that is correct. Mr. Keillor stated the city needs to get the crossings fixed and do a two phase project the crossings now and the pedestrians later. Mr. Keillor feels two years have already been wasted since he was at the council meeting in January 2017. Mr. Keillor asked Mr. Milum if he was planning for a sidewalk on one or both sides of the street. Mr. Milum stated it would be a sidewalk on both side which is what Mr. Keillor originally wanted the city to do. Mr. Keillor suggested that the south side of the road would be best side for a sidewalk. Mr. Keillor stated if the city is talking about a 9 ft extension he would like to offer two proposals. Mr. Keillor stated that wherever the continuous sidewalk is going to be is where it should be on at the crossings. Mr. Keillor asked how far is the crossing construction. Mr. Milum stated that the engineer informed him that one is 220 ft and the other is 275 ft. Mr. Keillor stated that was about 500 ft and if there is two side walks its about 1,000 ft if the city cuts the north side they still have 1,000 feet of side walk. Mr. Keillor estimated that from Paredes Line to Old Alice is 6,000 ft 1,000 of it is 15% to 16% of the entire way even if it's only the crossings at this point there is no point in putting two sidewalks that go nowhere. Bottom line regarding the sidewalks on especially the east end the road curves about 3 feet to the south if it was curved a little to the north and put the sidewalk on the south side. Mr.. Keillor stated that the only in pediment of 9 foot extension of that road the closest thing is the lift station. Mr. Keillor suggested it could be squeezed in if the city moved the street two feet to the north. Mr. Milum notified Mr. Keillor that it was already in the plans the way he had suggested. Mr. Keillor gave two alternatives for the city to think about. One was to extend 8 feet of pavement on the southside, put a heavy bold white line, continuous reflector bumpers and just have a walk lane. The second alternative would be to use 9 feet of concrete and suggest a 42 inch gutter which he believes would extend the road a little bit, a high curb and a 6 foot sidewalk behind it. Mr. Keillor believes it's time that the city looks into getting the project going, doing it right and making decisions and see how without additional easements or right of ways sneak a sidewalk in from one end to the other that's workable.

Mr. Milum asked if he was talking about not getting any easements and leaving it the 60 foot. Mr Keillor answered that he was talking about 9 feet within the 60 foot.

Mr. Keillor asked if over the crossings the city was looking at 80 feet. Mr. Milum answered yes. Mr. Keillor stated that then in that area the city would need to get the right of way or whatever it was they were perusing.

Mr. Milum explained that a collectors street is 80 foot of right of way and as people start to develop in that area it is being required for them to donate 10 feet. Mr. Milum stated

the city would take donations but he dosen't feel people will be lining up for that most people will want value for their 10 foot of property.

Council member Swain Real asked how big the street was going to be. Mr. Milum answered that he think it will have 28 feet on that crossing with a driving lane on each side with a shoulder.

Mr. Keillor stated it is the same as it is that the city is not changing the street or was a couple more feet going to be added.

Mr. Milum answered yes so that it would be wide enough for two cars to pass. Mr. Milum stated that at that time it was 20-21 feet.

Mr. Keillor stated it was 22-24 feet it varies at the eastern end a lot of it is 24 feet. But the area Mr. Keillor stated he was talking about was for the sidewalk he really was not talking about expanding the width of the road the road would stay the same with the exception if a 42 inch gutter is placed the city would gain 3 feet.

Mr. Keillor asked in regards to the crossings if the width would be expanded.

Mr. Milum answered yes because that was were the safety issue was the asphalt is not wide enough for two cars to comfortably pass.

Mr. Keillor replied that he was right but the safety issue in the past 4 years has not been the width of the asphalt but the deterioration of the last 3 feet.

Mr. Milum answered that no asphalt had dropped off. He explained that when the discussion of the projected the council and as well as the public involved wanted the resaca crossings wider then what it is. That why it went to 28 feet 12 and 12 is 24 which is the standard lane width and 2 feet extra on each side would make it 28 feet wide. Mr. Milum stated that was the decision and if the board would like to change they could.

Mr. Keillor suggested the city make one side and in the future try to fill in the other gap.

Mr. Milum suggested to add instead of a 4 foot side walk go to a 8-10 foot sidewalk. He did not have problem with it being on one side because it would save a lot of money.

Mr. Keillor stated he was using the figure of 6 foot sidewalk.

Mr. Villafranca stated he appreciates what the city does for the community. He understands there is a lot a planning that comes with a project like this and three years in his eyes is moving fast for a project like this. Mr. Villafrancas concern was flooding and wanted to make sure the proper drainage is considered. He wants to make sure the proper steps are taken and the project is done properly.

Mr. Salvatore wanted to know if the sidewalk and guardrail would be ADA complaint and wanted to see it in writing. Mr. Salvatore also stated his concern on what landscaping and lighting would be done. Mr. Milum stated he did not have a problem showing him what he was requesting get would the information for him.

Mr. Milum and the council answered questions for the audience and discussed the project.

Mr. Milum explained there is an opportunity for a \$150,000 grant with a match of \$150,000. Mr. Milum feels confident we will get approved for the grant. If we do the city can use the total amount of \$300,00 to match another grant for \$300,000 making the project total \$600,00. If successful it is estimated that the canal can be put underground to almost where it crosses FM 1847.

Ernesto Martinez, President of Bayview Irrigation District No.11, introduced himself to the council. He stated there was no doubt this was a project they really want to happen. He explained the benefits that would come from locating the canal underground. He explained how they have worked to try to keep the canal clean, but unfortunatly at this time they are not able to assist with the match.

Mr. Milum and members of the Bayview Irrigation District No. 11 present answered questions for the council and discussed the project. It was discussed that this could help with the flooding in the Valle Alto Area.

RESOLUTION OPPOSING ANNEXATION AND DETACHMENT OF LOS FRESNOS CONSOLIDATED INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT TERRITORY

STATE OF TEXAS § SCOUNTY OF CAMERON §

WHEREAS, without consultation with the Los Fresnos Consolidated School District, ("Los Fresnos CISD" or the "District"), Brownsville Independent School District ("BISD" or "neighboring district"), posted an agenda item for its December 11, 2018 board meeting which stated: "Discussion, consideration and possible action for approval of a Resolution requesting that the Legislators, through Senator Eddie Lucio and Alex Dominguez make the limits of BISD match the city limits of Brownsville, and that the area of Cameron County south of the Port of Brownsville up to the gulf become part of BISD territory as well."; and

WHEREAS, the BISD Board of Trustees at its December 11, 2018 board meeting unanimously voted to adopt a board resolution directing "the Superintendent to work with state legislators and surrounding district superintendents, whose boundaries overlap with the City of Brownsville, so that we can discuss feasilility plan to either exchange or collapse boundaries to better serve Brownsville students."

WHEREAS, if a forced taking of District territory is allowed, three school districts' territories would be affected, including Los Fresnos CISD; and

WHEREAS, the boundaries of the Los Fresnos CISD have existed decades prior to the City of Brownsville annexation of the Los Fresnos territory that remains in the city limits of Brownsville; and

WHEREAS, families have intentionally purchased homes in the city limits of Brownsville because their land was located within Los Fresnos CISD territories; and

WHEREAS, as a result of a forced taking of Los Fresnos CISD territory, the district would be stripped of all title to property, assets and debt, including real property located within the City limits; and

WHEREAS, Los Fresnos CISD took on bonded indebtedness to provide facilities and campuses in order to accommodate growth of the new development in District territory located within the city limits of Brownsville; and

WHEREAS, the Texas legislation previously adopted laws in 1995 that provide for a detachment and annexation of territory in Chapter 13 of the Texas Education Code; and

WHEREAS, the current laws found in Chapter 13 of the Texas Education Code provide for annexation and detachment of school district territory, but only after petitions filed by a majority of registered voters of the territory in question or by the surface owners of the taxable property in the territory or through collaboration between the neighboring districts, and only with the approval of all elected boards of trustees of the affected territory; and

WHEREAS, none of the requirements outlined in Texas Education Code, Sections 13.051 or 13.231 have been met by the neighboring school district to allow for any legal detachment or annexation of Los Fresnos CISD territory; and

WHEREAS, Los Fresno's CISD has been recognized as an educational leader in the State of Texas with Board members elected as the 1999 and 2010 Outstanding School Board of Trustees. Los Fresnos C.I.S.D. has consistently shown that the district provides a quality and exceptional educational experience that has been recognized at both the state and national levels. This includes accolades such as:

- Los Fresnos CISD received an A rating from the Texas Education Agency in 2018, a rating earned by only 12% of districts in the state;
- Los Fresnos CISD has received the Post-Secondary Readiness Distinction every year since the measure was implemented in Texas.
- The District is 1 of only 5 districts in the entire state to achieve the Post Secondary Readiness Distinction for 5 consecutive years;
- Los Fresnos CISD has sustained a steady number of AP scholars throughout the years and was awarded the Gaston Capperton Inspiration Award for increasing the percentage of Economically Disadvantaged Students who participate in rigorous coursework;
- Los Fresnos CISD has no academically unacceptable schools;
- Los Fresnos CISD has consistently increased completion rates and decreased dropout rates;
- Los Fresnos CISD presently has 2 National Blue Ribbon Schools;
- Los Fresnos CISD has consistently maintained some of the highest State Accountability Scores in both the Region and the State;

WHEREAS, the District's vision to provide innovative teaching methods and create a district-wide culture where students can select and pursue career pathways and develop the needed skills to prepare them for post-secondary education and the world of work would be compromised by the legislation stripping the District of real property, students and resources; and

WHEREAS, such proposed legislation evidences no consideration as to the impact or wellbeing of the resources, citizens, parents and education of students of the District; and

WHEREAS, the resounding consensus of parents and students in the territory in question appear to object to any detachment and annexation of Los Fresnos property;

WHEREAS, any such legislation of this nature would set a precedent to strip Districts of territory; and

WHEREAS, numerous other school districts throughout the state of Texas also have territory that was annexed by cities that have school districts and these districts could suffer similar unwarranted and unprecedented taking of District property and resources if such legislation was adopted; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees on behalf of its students, employees, community members and stakeholders on behalf of its taxpayers and citizens must vehemently oppose any such attempt by a neighboring school district to force the taking of District territory.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Los Fresnos CISD Board of Trustees on behalf of the Los Fresnos CISD school district, its students and parents, object and oppose Brownsville ISD's attempt to secure any legislative action that would circumvent Chapter 13 of the Texas Education Code, and would redraw Los Fresnos CISD school district attendance zones and property and to prevent a taking of Los Fresnos CISD territory that was purchased and improved by the District through taxpayer dollars and as a result of bonds approved by citizens. Chapter 13 of the Texas Education Code has set out the legal means to detach and annex territory.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Los Fresnos CISD authorized the Superintendent to engage state legislators, including Senator Lucio and Representative Dominguez, to lodge the District's opposition; and

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Superintendent or his designee is authorized to take such action necessary on behalf of the Board of Trustees to object and nullify any such proposed legislation or attempt to take Los Fresnos CISD territory.

This Master Use Agreement is made this _____ day of ______, 2019 in Harlingen, Texas between (1) Cameron County Emergency Communication District, hereinafter "CCECD," having a principal place of business at 501 Camelot Drive, Harlingen, Texas 78550, (2) South Texas Emergency Care Foundation, hereinafter "STECF," having a principle place of business at 1705 Vermont Ave, Harlingen, Texas 78550, (3) City of Los Fresnos, Texas, hereinafter "City of Los Frenos," having a principal place of business at 200 North Brazil, Los Fresnos, Texas 78566.

I.

Purpose of Agreement

Α.

Understanding that CCECD has acquired and established, for use in Cameron County <u>only</u>, the said Early Warning Notification System (EWNS), also referred to, at time, as an Emergency Alert System (EAS), for certain (and <u>only</u> for) emergencies, utilizing the 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Number Service (ETNS) in Cameron County (<u>only</u>) and VESTA ALERT (REVERSE 911[®]) System technology, with technical assistance provided by STECF to implement and oversee the operation of the EWNS, in cooperation with CCECD, this Agreement is to memorialize those arrangements between CCECD and STECF, and further, to establish operational protocols for the said EWNS, involving arrangments between CCECD and STECF, on behalf of the EWNS, with "City of Los Fresnos" which can serve, as a "user" of the CCECD EWNS.

Attachment: Cameron County 9-1-1 part 1 (2917 : Cameron County Reverse 9-1-1 System)

The said arrangements and operational protocols for the EWNS are set forth in this Agreement, as if this was an "operations manual" (as set forth as the terms of this Agreement).

C.

Attached as Schedule A is a list of the eight primary PSAPs, the secondary PSAP, Emergency Medical Service Providers, and the Fire Suppression and Prevention Services in Cameron County.

II.

Operational Protocols

Α.

The Operational Protocols for the Early Warning Notification System (EWNS) are addressed in the following paragraphs, and are to be considered as rules governing the use of the EWNS (i.e., the EAS), protocols for the operation of the EWNS, and contractual provisions that are binding (as appropriate) upon all of the parties to this Agreement.

в.

Attached as Schedule B is a true and correct copy of CCECD Order #2019-1 of the CCECD Board of Managers, which amends and renews the established EWNS in Cameron County, utilizing VESTA ALERT technology in and (only) for Cameron County, under the auspices of CCECD.

C.

Attached to CCECD Order #2019-1, as Exhibit A to that Order is the Early Warning Notification System (EWNS) Protocol (Cameron County, Texas) that was adopted for use by CCECD for the EWNS, utilizing VESTA ALERT technology, a true and correct copy of that (General) EWNS Protocol being attached to his Master Use Agreement as Schedule C.

D.

Attached as Schedule D is a true and correct copy of the (Specific) EWNS/EAS Protocol Manual for Cameron County, Texas, which addresses day to day operations and technical matters (e.g., "call initiation" protocols) that are required by CCECD

Attachment: Cameron County 9-1-1 part 1(2917:Cameron County Reverse 9-1-1 System)

in establishing the VESTA ALERT (REVERSE 911[®]) System in Cameron County, as the EWNS, in conjunction with CCECD's Emergency Telephone Number Service (ETNS), by STECF, as the VESTA ALERT (REVERSE 911[®]) System "facility" (i.e., "facilitator) for the EWNS, as well as CAMCO, as the designated State Emergency Coordinator for Cameron County, the EWNS to be utilized by both CAMCO and the said Primary PSAPs.

Ε.

Attached as Schedule E is a true and correct copy of a Resolution of the CCECD Board of Managers, dated January 16, 2019, addressing the mandatory difference to CAMCO in the use and operation of the EWNS (and the VESTA ALERT System) in the event of a <u>County-wide</u> emergency, as explained in and required by that Resolution); in summary, in the event of a <u>County-wide</u> emergency, such as a hurricane heading towards this area, the VESTA ALERT System's use is controlled (for such <u>County-wide</u> emergencies only) exclusively by CAMCO.

F.

In the event of a conflict between the two said protocols, (1) Schedule C (the General EWNS Protocol for Cameron County, Texas of the CCECD Board of Managers) and (2) Schedule D (the specific EWNS/EAS Protocol Manual for Cameron County, Texas), the General EWNS Protocol (Schedule C) governs and controls, except for technical matters and specific operational procedures.

III.

Payment

Α.

Unless otherwise indicated in this Master Use Agreement, no user of the EWNS, as described above (i.e., the eight primary PSAPs, CAMCO's Emergency Management Division, and VMUD2 or CCECD, STECF or CAMCO (even if functioning solely as a "user"), are required to pay <u>any</u> sum of money for using or operating the CCECD EWNS.

The parties hereto agree that the consideration of the execution of this Agreement has been received by each (other) party, as appropriate.

IV.

Term of Agreement

Α.

The term of this Agreement shall be one (1) year, commencing ______, 2019 and ending _____

_____, 2020, which shall automatically renew, unless notice to the contrary is delivered to CCECD, STECF and CAMCO (all three) by any of the said (eight) Primary PSAPs, Secondary PSAP, CAMCO or VMUD2.

в.

All of the provisions of this Agreement shall survive the execution and performance of this instrument, as well as the expiration of any such term.

v.

Termination

This Agreement may be terminated (a) as to any party desiring to "opt out" of this Agreement, for cause (including any action constituting a breach of the terms of this Agreement), by that party as appropriate, (b) by mutual agreement of the parties, or (c) in the event of any occurrence (e.g., bankruptcy, dissolution or governmental action, as appropriate) precluding any party from performing the obligations contemplated under this Agreement.

VI.

Insurance

All parties agree to obtain insurance (to the extent available) in the type and amount deemed advisable to protect their respective interest; to this extent, the parties agree to provide insurance for their respective employees, conveyances, equipment, facilities, and instrumentalities, as appropriate.

VII.

Status of Parties

The parties do <u>not</u> have the relationship of partners, joint venturers, principal-agent or employer-employee; the parties are separate entities who enter into this Agreement for their respective benefit.

Entire Agreement

Α.

This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties relating to the rights granted herein and the obligations assumed herein, and supersedes any prior understandings, representations, memorandums or agreements regarding the service relationship that is the subject of this Agreement.

Any oral representations or modification concerning this instrument shall be of no force or effect; this Agreement may be amended, provided that no amendment, modification or alteration of the terms of this Agreement shall be binding unless set forth in writing and signed by both parties.

IX.

Law Governing; Venue

THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE GOVERENED BY AND CONSTRUED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS (AND WHERE APPLICABLE, THE LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA); FURTHER, THE OBLIGATIONS AND UNDERTAKINGS OF EACH OF THE PARTIES TO THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE PERFORMABLE IN CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS.

Waiver

Any waiver by any party of any default under or breach of this Agreement shall not constitute a continuing waiver of such default or breach, or a waiver of our permission for (express or implied) any other or subsequent default or breach.

XI.

Assignment

This Agreement shall not be assigned in whole or in part by any party without the approval of CCECD, STECF <u>and</u> City of Los Fresnos, set forth in writing and signed by those parties; any assignee will be bound by the terms of this agreement.

XII.

Warranties or Representations

Α.

ALL PARTIES TO THIS AGREEMENT SPECIFICALLY ACKNOWLEDGE THAT NO WARRANTY OR REPRESENTATION OF ANY KIND WHATSOEVER IS BEING MADE BY ANY PARTY IN CONNECTION WITH THE EXECUTION OR PERFORMANCE OF THIS AGREEMENT, except as set forth in this instrument.

ALL PARTIES AGREE TO RELEASE AND HOLD HARMLESS ALL OTHER (PARTIES) FOR ANY AND ALL CLAIMS ARISING FROM THE ENTRY INTO, THE EXECUTION OF, THE ENFORCEMENT OF, OR THE INTERPRETATION OF THIS AGREEMENT.

XIII.

Parties Bound

This Agreement shall be binding upon inure to the benefit of the parties to this Agreement and their respective heirs, legal representatives, successors and assigns, as appropriate; however, there are <u>no</u> third-party beneficiaries to this Agreement.

XIV.

Notice

Α.

Any notice to any party shall be in writing and sent by certified or registered mail, telefax, courier or hand-delivery, addressed to that party as set forth above, at that party's address set forth above or such other address as may be designated.

Arbitration

ANY DISPUTE, CONTROVERSY OR CLAIM ARISING UNDER OR RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, OR THE BREACH, TERMINATION OR INVALIDITY THEREOF, SHALL BE SETTLED (EXCEPT WHERE THE PARTIES HERTO RESOLVE ANY SUCH DISPUTE, CONTROVERSY OR CLAIM BY AGREEMENT) BY ARBITRATION <u>ONLY</u> (I.E. ANY SUCH DISPUTE, CONTROVERSY OR CLAIM WILL <u>NOT</u> BE RESOLVED BY OR THROUGH ANY COURT OR JUDICIAL PROCEEDING, AND FUTHER, THERE SHALL BE <u>NO</u> PRE-TRIAL DISCOVERY), IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE FEDERAL ARBITRATION ACT AND THE COMMERCIAL ARBITRATION RULES OF THE AMERICAN ARBITRATION ASSOCIATION (THIS DOES <u>NOT</u> REQUIRE THE USE OF SUCH ASSOCIATION), USING ONE ARBITRATOR, TO BE SELECTED BY AGREEMENT OF THE PARTIES, SUCH ARBITRATION TO BE CONDUCTED IN BROWNSVILLE, CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS, IN THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE, AND A JUDGEMENT UPON THE AWARD RENDERED BY THE ARBITRATOR MAY BE ENTERED IN ANY COURT HAVING JURISDITION THEREOF.

If any proceeding is initiated to resolve a dispute arising under or relating to this Agreement by either of the parties herto, it is expressly agreed that the prevailing party as defined in <u>Black's</u> <u>Law</u> <u>Dictionary</u> 1352 (Rev. 4th ed. 1968) (<u>Prevailing Party</u>) shall be entitled to recover from the other party reasonable attorney fees, costs and expenses, in addition to any other (including by not limited to declatory, or injuctive or monetary) relief that may be awarded.

XVI.

Invalidity

Α.

If any term, provision, covenant or condition of this Agreement is held by the said arbitrator to be invalid/illegal or unenforceable, the remainder of those providions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated. It is the intention of the parties to this Agreement that in lieu of each clause or provision of this Agreement that is held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable, there be added as a part of this Agreement a clause or provision as similar in terms to such invalid, illegal or unenforceable clause or provision as is possible which shall nevertheless be valid, legal and enforceable.

XVII.

Construction of Instrument

C.

It is the specific intention of the parties to this Agreement that this Agreement constitutes a final and executed instrument binding upon all parties to the said instrument.

XVIII.

Authority

Α.

The parties to this Agreement warrant and represent that (1) the signatories below are authorized to act on behalf of the respective party to this instrument, (2) the signatories have been authorized to execute this instrument by the said parties in accordance with the requisite corporate formalities of each such party, (3) the execution of this instrument by the said

signatories constitutes the binding act of each such party to this instrument, and (4) the execution of this instrument and the adoption of same by each party is authorized by law.

в.

CCECD, STECF and City of Los Fresnos hereby certify that pursuant to the respective legal authority under which each party was formed, each party is authorized to enter into this Agreement.

XIX.

Compliance with Law

The parties will act, at all times, in compliance with all pertinent and applicable laws.

XX.

Force Majeure

In the event that any party shall be prevented from completing performance of its respective obligations hereunder by an "Act of God" or any other occurrence whatsoever which is beyond the control of the parties, then that party shall be excused from any further performance of its obligations and undertaking under this Agreement, provided that, in the event that any such performance is <u>only</u> interrupted or delayed, the affected party shall <u>only</u> be excused from that performance for that period of time as is reasonably necessary after such occurrence to remedy the effects thereof.

ORDER #2019-1 OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE CAMERON COUNTY EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION DISTRICT

BE IT RESOLVED that on the <u>16th</u> day of January, 2019, the Board of Managers of the Cameron County Emergency Communication District (CCECD) convened, and the following item was placed on the Agenda of the Board for such meeting, pursuant to Chapter 551 of the Texas Government Code (the Texas Open Meetings Act), to be considered:

"Consideration of and authorization to amend the EWNS Protocol and renew the User Agreements for the established Early Warning Notification System (EWNS - VESTA ALERT System) in Cameron County.

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 772.307 of the Texas Health & Safety Code (Powers and Duties of Board [authorizing the Board to "adopt rules for the operation of the district"]), the Board established an Early Warning Notification System (EWNS) in Cameron County, for certain emergencies, utilizing the 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Number Service (ETNS) in Cameron County, allowing for telephone line users/owners to be notified through their telephone of emergency situations, through the 9-1-1 ETNS, utilizing REVERSE 911[®] [now - VESTA ALERT System] technology. Resolution Order #2009-1 dated April 15, 2009.

WHEREAS, the CCECD Board, upon consideration of the proposal, finds that EWNS Protocols and User Agreements should be updated and renewed in Cameron County and adopted by the CCECD Board.

NOW, THEREFORE, upon a Motion duly made, seconded and voted upon, IT IS (unanimously) ORDERED that the Board of Managers of the Cameron County Emergency Communication District (CCECD), established, pursuant to the predecessor to Subchapter D of Chapter 772 of the Texas Health & Safety Code, to initiate and operate the ETNS to provide the public with timely emergency aid in Cameron County, pursuant to the CCECD Board's authority to issue orders (rules) under Section 772.307 of the Texas Health and Safety Code, herby authorizes the renewal of the User Agreements and the amendment of the EWNS Protocol for the established EWNS (VESTA ALERT System) in Cameron County.

IT IS ORDERED that this Order (#2019-1) be filed in the Minutes of the CCECD Board of Managers, and that a duplicate of this order be presented (as soon as possible) the VESTA ALERT "facility", all emergency service providers in Cameron County, all PSAPs in Cameron County, all incorporated municipalities in Cameron County, the "government" of Cameron County, and any other party requiring same.

Schedule C

Early Warning Notification System (EWNS) Protocol (Cameron County, Texas)

I.

Introduction

Α.

At the request of various participating jurisdictions, the Cameron County Emergency Communication (9-1-1) District (CCECD) agreed to expand the Emergency Telephone Number Service (ETNS) to include the provision of an Early Warning Notification System (EWNS), in conjunction with AT&T and VESTA ALERT Systems (Reverse 911®), using VESTA ALERTT technology; the following provisions set forth the rules or procedures governing the EWNS implemented by CCECD for Cameron County, using VESTA ALERT Technology.

в.

The participating jurisdictions in the ETNS are not required to use the EWNS to provide early warning notifications to their residents; those participating jurisdictions that do use the EWNS, however, agree to use the EWNS according to the "protocol" (i.e., procedures or regulations) set forth herein.

C.

The EWNS is an additional tool available to jurisdictions for the protection of their residents and <u>not in lieu of</u> other existing tools, as the EWNS is for <u>emergencies only</u>; thus, the efficient use of a shared and scarce resource mandates that the EWNS be reserved for use in life-threatening emergencies that require rapid notification of large number of people.

D.

The determination of what constitutes an emergency qualifying for the use of the EWNS is to be made by each participating jurisdiction, <u>subject to</u> this Protocol, and <u>examples</u> of such emergencies are listed below in Exhibit A; as there is great caution in the use of the 9-1-1 ETNS by people so as not "tie up" 9-1-1 lines for non-emergency reasons, the participating jurisdictions must strictly adhere to the

"emergency use only" requirement so as to not "tie up" or use the EWNS with or for any non-emergency use.

II

Pre-Initiation Requirements

Α.

Prior to any initiation of the EWNS, a participating jurisdiction is responsible for the following:

- Confirming to CCECD that the jurisdiction has established its own protocol, policies and procedures as to those governmental personnel authorized to request initiation of the EWNS for the participating jurisdiction, and the protocol, policies and procedures to be utilized.
- 2) Agreeing that the participating jurisdiction requesting initiation of the EWNS will be referred to as the "initiator" of the VESTA ALERT notification, and that the protocol for initiating such notification, as set forth below, will result in the VESTA ALERT "launchers" commencing the notification process (the "launchers" work with CCECD but operate out of a distinct dispatching center, which will be referred to as the VESTA ALERT Facility.
- 3) Completing CCECD provided training, in conjunction with the establishment of the participating jurisdiction's (own)protocols.

в.

CCECD shall be responsible for the following:

- Issuing ID codes and personal passwords for those individuals authorized to initiate the EWNS for a jurisdiction (see Paragraph II.A.1. above); personal passwords are valid indefinitely, subject to change, when deemed to be necessary by CCECD.
- 2) Setting the number of attempts for call completion CCECD must make before a specific call is abandoned, which number will be set with input from CCECD's participating jurisdictions, but the ultimate decision will be made by CCECD's Board; the designated number of attempts must be the same for all jurisdictions participating in the EWNS.

III.

Initiation

Α.

The EWNS "facility," utilizing VESTA ALERT technology, upon an authorized request (with validation from a participating jurisdiction), shall "launch" the EWNS, but again, the EWNS is to be used only for emergency calls.

в.

A participating jurisdiction shall request that an area be notified based on a determined polygon, an intersection and specific radius, or address and specified radius.

C.

A participating jurisdiction will request the use of a prerecorded message or of a dynamic message, which will be entered, at the EWNS "facility," through the said "launcher"; examples of pre-recorded messages (which will be available in English <u>and</u> Spanish) might be as follows:

- 1) "THIS IS AN EMERGENCY MESSAGE. A CHEMICAL SPILL HAS OCCURRED IN YOUR AREA. YOU ARE INSTRUCTED TO SHELTER IN PLACE."
- 2) "THIS IS AN EMERGENCY MESSAGE. A CHEMICAL SPILL HAS OCCURRED IN YOUR AREA. YOU ARE INSTRUCTED TO EVACUATE THE AREA."

D.

Any authorized personnel designated by their jurisdiction can initiate the system, modify the initiation, or end the initiation.

Ε.

An incomplete call will be re-tried according to the number of attempts authorized in Paragraph II.B.2. above.

F.

When a telephone with a "Caller ID feature" receives an EWNS call the phrase "CAMERON 911" will appear on the "Caller ID" screen.

When all of the said calls have been completed, the EWNS "facility" will notify the participating jurisdiction(s) that requested the initiation.

IV.

Security

Α.

The EWNS "facility" will ask the participating jurisdictions identification codes and personal passwords for the purpose of validating the request for an initiation of the EWNS.

в.

Periodically, CCECD will verify authorized personnel with the participating jurisdiction(s).

v.

Payment

This paragraph is intentionally blank.

VI.

Initiation Follow-Up

Α.

The use of the EWNS will generate a variety of reports; these reports will be made available to the participating jurisdiction(s); which reports are to include criteria set forth below in Exhibit B.

в.

These reports may be sent to the participating jurisdiction(s) via e-mail, telefax, regular mail or hand-delivery.

Training/Public Education

Α.

CCECD will provide <u>call initiation protocols</u> to the said participating jurisdiction(s), as referred to in Paragraph II. (Pre-Initiation Requirements - II and Initiation - III above.)

в.

CCECD will train appropriate personnel from each participating jurisdiction in all phases of the proper procedure to be used to request initiation.

с.

Each participating jurisdiction will be responsible for training its own personnel about these procedures.

D.

CCECD, in conjunction with participating jurisdictions will provide public education on the existence and use of the EWNS (i.e., VESTA ALERT, formally REVERSE 911[®]).

VIII.

Updates to EWNS Protocol

The CCECD Board of Managers shall continue to review (periodically) the EWNS (i.e., VESTA ALERT) and recommendations for new or changed procedures in this protocol will be addressed by the Board, with the input of the Director of Communication; such recommendations will be submitted to the participating jurisdiction for (their) response, and finally, to the CCECD Board for formal approval and adoption, although the final decision as to any changes to this Protocol is to be made by CCECD Board.

IX.

General Provisions

Α.

CCECD, acting by and through its Board of Managers (its governing body), avers that NO WARRANTY OR REPRESENTATION OF ANY KIND WHATSOEVER IS BEING MADE BY ANY PARTY IN CONNECTION WITH THE EXECUTION OF OR PERFORMANCE UNDER THIS PROTOCOL. THIS PROTOCOL SHALL BE GOVERENED BY AND CONSTRUED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS (AND WHERE APPLICABLE, THE LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA); THE OBLIGATIONS AND UNDERTAKINGS OF ANY OF THE PARTIES TO THIS PROTOCOL SHALL BE PERFORMABLE IN CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS.

c.

As used in this protocol, whenever the context so indicates, (1) the masculine, feminine or neuter gender, (2) the singular or plural number, and (3) the individual or corporate capacity, shall each be deemed to include the others.

Schedule D

EARLY WARNING NOTIFICATION SYSTEM (EWNS/EAS) CALL INITIATION PROTOCOL MANUAL (CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS)

Introduction

The VESTA ALERT System is an emergency notification system that is capable of providing critical incident notifications to wire-line, cellular or Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) telephones within the boundaries of Cameron County. The VESTA ALERT System utilizes the CCECD 9-1-1 Automatic Location Identification (ALI) feature of AT&T's database in conjunction with its own polygon mapping applications to launch critical alerts. Wireless numbers are maintained by the user through a self-registration portal. When new wireless telephone service is activated in Cameron County, the resident desiring to receive the VESTA ALERT System's Emergency or Disaster Alert Notifications is required to login to the VESTA ALERT System via the CCECD website or by contacting (855) 879-1911 to register his phone number or update his information. CCECD staff will validate the resident's information for approval. Other VESTA ALERT system alerts such as Hazmat, SWAT, Fire, Epidemic, etc., will use a combination of the ALI database and emergency/disaster alert registered numbers to inform residents of those particular crisis situations. Periodically, the ALI database will be sent to the VESTA ALERT System servers by CCECD in order to synchronize database accordingly.

VESTA ALERT System Utilization

It is essential to understand that the VESTA ALERT System is an additional tool available with Cameron County for the protection of its residents, and is not a substitute for other existing emergency reporting or response tools. The VESTA ALERT System is only to be used for **Major Emergencies** which impact multiple entities or residents within specific geographic areas as determined by emergency dispatch and response agency. Examples of such emergencies can be found in Exhibit A of this document. Just as residents should take great caution in using the 9-1-1 system so as not to overburden it for non-emergency reasons, those authorized to "launch alerts" must adhere to the "major emergency-use-only" requirement so as not to overload the system with less than "major impact" emergencies. Overutilization of the VESTA ALERT System could also result in a lack of attention and response by residents who may receive numerous (unnecessary) alert calls. The VESTA ALERT System is not intended for use as a public announcement or information system, except as for major emergencies as described above.

A. Pre-activation requirements

1. Prior to the activation of the VESTA ALERT System, each agency authorized to "launch" a VESTA ALERT System notification is responsible for the following:

- a. Identifying authorized individuals who will be assigned to launch the alerts. The STECF "MedCom dispatch center," the VESTA ALERT System "facility," will have VESTA ALERT System "Alert Launch Authority" on a 7 day/week, 24 hours/day, 365 day/year basis. In addition, the Cameron County (CAMCO) Emergency Management Division will also have direct authority to launch these alerts.
- b. Each authorized agency must be able to identify the exact geographical area that is impacted by a crisis situation.
- c. Prior to being authorized to launch a VESTA ALERT System Notification, all pertinent agencies must complete CCECD VESTA ALERT System training.
- 2. South Texas Emergency Care Foundation (STECF) shall be responsible for the following:
 - a. Entering and maintaining on the VESTA ALERT System the names of the VESTA ALERT System "Alert Launch Authorized" personnel. Requests made from a person who is <u>not</u> authorized will <u>not</u> be accepted; as to (Texas) DPS or other state officials, they will utilize the statewide emergency communications system, as appropriate.
 - b. Administering the VESTA ALERT Systems application, databases and security, but this does <u>not</u> include VESTA ALERT System "launch" responsibilities, except in <u>extreme</u> circumstances (i.e., when the other "Launch Authorities" are unable to meet the said criteria).
 - c. Providing updates and statistics to pertinent agencies as to the use of the VESTA ALERT System notifications in order to track the System's effectiveness.

B. Activation

1. The agencies authorized to launch the VESTA ALERT systems notification will be the Dispatch Centers at the eight Primary PSAPs in Cameron County (which does <u>not</u> include STECF) <u>and</u> the Cameron County Emergency Management Division. Alerts, as required, will be launched in consultation with the dispatch authorities of the Cameron County law enforcement, fire suppression and prevention, emergency medical services and health agencies, depending on the type of alert required and the location of the emergency. In all cases, the Launch Authority issuing an alert should notify other dispatch centers and other "Alert Launch Authorities" of the action, in order to avoid confusion in responding to an emergency (taking into account that in the event of a County wide emergency, all such launches are <u>subordinate</u>, at that time, to the Cameron County Emergency Management Division).

- 2. Launch Authorized personnel are responsible for the security of their individual launch codes, and must assure that the codes are <u>not</u> shared or distributed to unauthorized individuals. Each dispatching department will determine appropriate dispatching action, based on their own codes of conduct, should a code security infraction or breach occur.
- 3. An emergency must be significant and severe, in terms of public health or safety, to warrant the activation of the VESTA ALERT Emergency Notification System. Examples include but are not limited to hazardous material releases, fires, active shooters, etc. See Exhibit A for more examples.

The requesting agency should call South Texas Emergency Care Foundation (STECF) directly at 956-444-0911 to request activation of the VESTA ALERT Emergency Notification System.

- a. Activation message should be no more than 30 seconds in length, and not exceed 60 seconds. Message exceeding 30 seconds in length will affect system performance and result in less successful call deliveries.
- b. The Authorized Launch Agency should be careful to word messages in a precise manner, within the parameters described above.
- 4. A Launch Authority will be able to use a pre-recorded message or scenario. The System <u>also</u> supports texting and e-mail alert messages. Examples of pre-recorded messages are as follows:
 - a. "THIS IS AN EMERGENCY MESSAGE FROM CAMERON COUNTY THAT MAY AFFECT YOUR AREA."

OR

- b. "THIS IS AN EMERGENCY MEESSAGE. A CHEMICAL SPILL HAS OCCURRED IN YOUR AREA. YOU ARE INSTRUCTED TO SHELTER IN PLACE."
- 5. An unsuccessful call will be re-tried three times, using default parameters established within the VESTA ALERT Emergency Notification System.

C. Security

- 1. STECF will appoint an "overall" VESTA ALERT Emergency Notification System Administrator, who will provide necessary training and logins to Authorized Launch Personnel from the Authorized Launch Centers.
- 2. The Launch Authorities should maintain an updated list of the VESTA ALERT Emergency Notification System's Authorized Personnel for the pertinent situation and should use secure methods to protect sensitive VESTA ALERT System information pertaining to launch requests and activation.

3. STECF has "overall security administration responsibility" for the VESTA ALERT Systems application and is the <u>only</u> entity authorized to administer VESTA ALERT System access <u>and</u> certification.

D. Activation Follow Up

- 1. The VESTA ALERT System can generate a variety of reports for each Launch Authority. These reports are available, within the scope of authorization, for the release of VESTA ALERT System information. See Exhibit B for examples of reports available via the VESTA ALERT System.
- 2. STECF will produce Alert Reports as needed to track the use of the System for major emergency situations.

E. Training/Public Education

- 1. STECF will provide Call Activation Protocols to Launch Authorized Agencies <u>only</u>.
- 2. STECF will train appropriate personnel, from each Authorized Launch Center, about all phases of the proper procedures to complete an alert activation.
- 3. STECF, in conjunction with the said participating agencies, will provide "public education" on the existence and use of the VESTA ALERT System (as augmented by the CCECD Public Education Program).

F. Updates to the VESTA ALERT System Call Initiation Protocol Manual

This Manual is a living document subject to changes agreed upon by all pertinent parties. As the VESTA ALERT System in Cameron County matures through use, changes to this Manual may be required to make the operational and administrative process more efficient. As such, the following "changes" to this Manual will be available:

- 1. Ordinary changes: VESTA ALERT System users can make recommendations for new or changed protocols/procedures. These recommendations will be processed through the STECF VESTA ALERT System Administrator, and such recommendations will be submitted to the participating Launch Authorities for review, and finally to the CCECD Board of Managers for Approval and adoption, in accordance with CCECD Orders, Protocols and Agreements.
- 2. Special changes: STECF reserves the right to make changes to these protocols as circumstances dictate. In this regard, STECF decisions about the need for changes may be dictated by upgrades to the VESTA ALERT System applications, command and input changes, and the like. STECF will keep all pertinent agencies informed of such changes and will revise the said training, as required.

3. CCECD makes every effort to provide the most advanced notification system that is available; however, since many factors are beyond CCECD's control, *no guarantee or warranty of any kind whatsoever* is made that the System will be available <u>or</u> will perform successfully every time.

G. Master Use Agreement

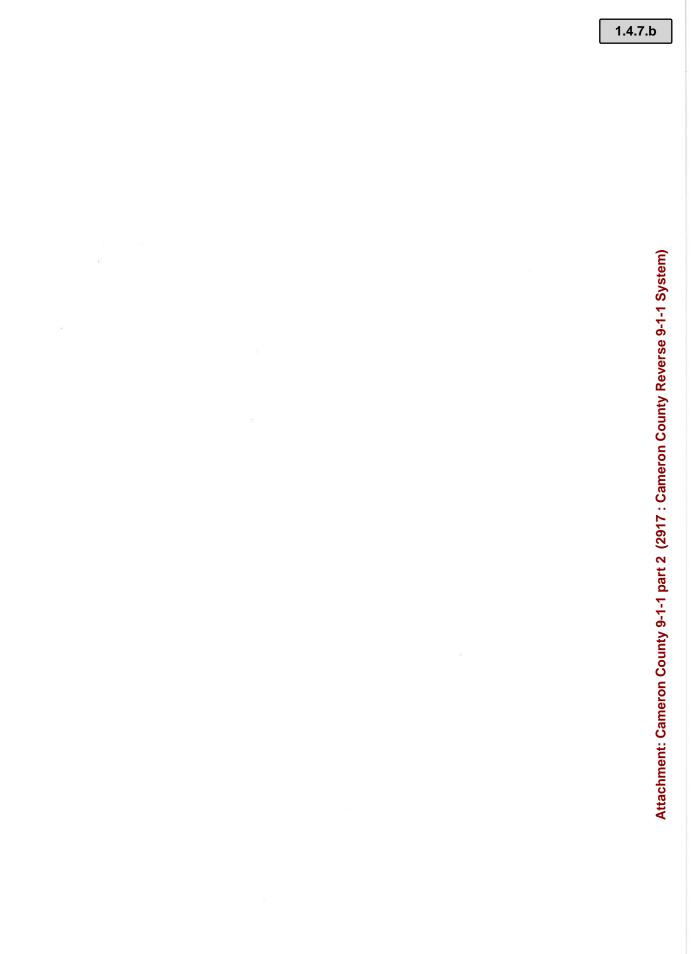

WHEREAS, CCECD established an Early Earning Notification System (EWNS) in Cameron County for certain emergencies, utilizing the 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Number Service (ETNS) in Cameron County and VESTA ALERT Technology.

WHEREAS, in the event of certain emergencies, once the EWNS, also known as "VESTA ALERT," is activated, a participating jurisdiction in Cameron County (a municipality or the County) could initiate a "VESTA ALERT) telephone call to warn a selected area of a hazardous material leak, an explosion, a building collapse and so forth.

WHEREAS, if the emergency involved a local matter, such as an escape from a jail or a large fire, as distinguished from a county wide matter, such as a hurricane, individual municipalities can work independently to address any such emergency.

WHEREAS, if the emergency involved a hurricane, different participating jurisdictions could conflict with each other in the handling of such a large-scale emergency situation, involving possible road closures, evacuations and the like, requiring <u>centralized</u> emergency management.

WHEREAS, in the event of such a <u>large-scale</u> emergency situation, The State of Texas, according to the Governor's Office and its Emergency Management Division, is "in charge," but that authority is <u>delegated</u> to the "local" political subdivision of the State, which is Cameron County, by and through the Cameron County Judge. WHEREAS, in light of that legal requirement and standard, the CCECD Board of Managers, on behalf of CCECD, hereby confirms that for a <u>County-wide</u> (or <u>large-scale</u>) emergency situation, for the purpose of operation of emergency communications throughout the County, through the ETNS, and for the <u>specific</u> purpose of the operation of the (VESTA ALERT) <u>EWNS</u>, <u>all</u> such emergencies are to be <u>coordinated</u> by and through the Cameron County Judge and the Cameron County Emergency Management

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) (hereafter termed "MOU") is entered into by and between the CITY OF LOS FRESNOS (hereafter referred to as "CITY"), and RESEARCH, APPLIED TECHNOLOGY, EDUCATION, AND SERVICE (RATES) D.B.A. RATES/RGV (hereafter referred to as "RATES/RGV"), a 501(c)3 Not-for Profit formed to promote and coordinate the collaborative and cooperative use of technology by and among colleges, high schools, community school districts, public and school libraries, health care facilities, government offices, businesses, health and educational professionals, other educational and community services organizations and community residents for the benefit of the collaborating organizations, their clients, and community residents of the Rio Grande Valley.

SECTION 1 PURPOSE

- **1.01 CITY** and **RATES/RGV** agree to enter into this **MOU** as a manner by which **RATES/RGV** can actively participate in this **CITY'S** effort to respond and comply with the *Texas Commission on Environmental Quality* ("TCEQ") *TPDES Phase II Stormwater Rules*.
- **1.02 RATES/RGV** desires to participate in the development of a Regional Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System ("TPDES") Stormwater Permit Application and Regional SWMP, since such participation will provide **RATES/RGV** with an avenue for students and stakeholders to:
 - A. Provide research and educational opportunities, including allowing students of all ages to prepare official municipal documents for compliance with federal and state environmental regulations;
 - B. Gain knowledge and experience in the process and procedures of technical, financial and managerial compliance with governmental environmental regulations;
 - C. Provide capacity development experiences to the entire spectrum of stakeholders to promote collaborative and mutually beneficial regional economic development;

D. Study, research and design storm water system requirements pursuant to state and federal environmental regulations.

SECTION 2 TERM

- **2.01** *Fixed Term*: This **MOU** commences on the date of execution of final signature and will terminate immediately after issuance by TCEQ of a Stormwater Permit, unless extended according to section 2.02 of this **MOU**.
- **2.02** *Extension*: Upon written, mutual consent of **CITY** and **RATES/RGV**, this **MOU** may be extended for a maximum of one (1) calendar year, after the date of expiration of the Fixed Term.
- **2.03** *Cancellation*: This **MOU** may be cancelled prior to the expiration of the Fixed Term of any Extension Term, upon thirty (30) calendar days written notice to the other party.

SECTION 3 CONSIDERATION

3.01 *Fee:* **CITY** agrees to pay to **RATES/RGV \$6,000.00**. Payment of such fee is due in one single payment, tendered by check or wire transfer, payable to **RATES/RGV** and delivered at the address indicated in Section 5.01 of this **MOU**. Payment must be made within fourteen (14) days after execution of this **MOU**. Failure of **CITY** to make such payment within the prescribed time, and without a written extension from **RATES/RGV**, will result in this **MOU** terminating.

SECTION 4 RIGHTS AND DUTIES

- **4.01** The following rights and duties will be held or performed by **CITY**:
 - A. **CITY** will provide information, documentation requested by **RATES/RGV** within two (2) weeks. **CITY** will assign a point of contact to oversee this project, and provide to **RATES/RGV**, in writing, the name and contact information of the point(s) contact. **CITY** will perform field work and any other effort necessary to fulfill a request by **RATES/RGV** associated with this item 4.01(A), if necessary.
 - B. **CITY** will be responsible for paying the fee as detailed in Section 3.01 of this Agreement.
 - C. The **CITY** may make recommendations to **RATES/RGV**.

4.02 The following rights and duties will be held or performed by **RATES/RGV**:

- A. Governance:
 - 1. **RATES/RGV** will provide **CITY** with monthly updates.
 - 2. **RATES/RGV** will provide the following pursuant to TCEQ regulations:
 - a. Regional Stormwater Management Plan (SWMP)
 - b. Notice of Intent (NOI). NOI is identified as TCEQ Form 20368.
 - 3. **CITY** shall submit SWMP and NOI to TCEQ. **RATES/RGV** shall provide guidance.
- B. **RATES/RGV** will formulate and propose to the **CITY**, methods and approaches for compliance with the *Texas Commission on Environmental Quality Phase II Stormwater Rules*.
- C. Funding paid to **RATES/RGV** will be utilized by **RATES/RGV** for costs associated with but not necessarily limited to staffing, travel, training, equipment and materials, recruiting, scholarships, meal and food expenses associated with meetings and events, and communication related expenses.
- D. **RATES/RGV** is authorized to utilize funding to leverage grant funds, provide and support outreach activities, to support outreach events, and for sponsorships for environmental and educational events.
- E. Implementation of the BMPs included in the SWMP is beyond the scope of this **MOU** but may be included within the scope of Task Force membership agreement held with the current Task Force fiscal agent.

SECTION 5 MISCELLANEOUS

5.01 *Addresses*: Fee payment or notices required under this **MOU** may be sent by United States Postal Service regular surface mail, certified mail, registered mail, overnight delivery, or hand delivery. Written notice delivery is deemed made when the notice is deposited into a USPS mail receptacle, or deposited with an overnight carrier, or hand delivered. **CITY** and/or **RATES/RGV** can change the notice address by sending to the other party written indication of the new address. Notices should be addressed as follows:

- **5.02** <u>Force Majeure</u>: Any and all duties, obligations, and covenants of this **MOU** will be suspended during time of natural disaster, war, acts of terrorism, or other "Acts of God", which prevent a party from fulfilling any and all duties, obligations, and/or covenants of this **MOU**. If a party is prevented from fulfilling a duty, obligation, and/or covenant of this **MOU**, due to Force Majeure, the party prevented from fulfilling will notify the other party in writing, sent pursuant to Section 5.01 **MOU**, within fourteen (14) calendar business days of the Force Majeure event.
- **5.03** <u>Parties Relationship</u>: Nothing in the **MOU** should be construed as creating a partnership, joint venture, agency relationship, or any other relationship other than, between **CITY** and **RATES/RGV**.
- **5.04** <u>Applicable Law</u>: This **MOU** is construed under and in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas.
- **5.05** <u>Cumulative Rights</u>: All rights, options, and remedies contained in this **MOU** and held by **CITY** and **RATES/RGV** are cumulative and the exercising of one will not exclude exercising another. **CITY** and **RATES/RGV** each have the right to pursue any remedy or relief which may be provided by law, in equity, or by the stipulations of this **MOU**.
- **5.06** <u>Non-waiver</u>: A waiver by either **CITY** or **RATES/RGV**, or both, of any obligation, duty, or covenant of this **MOU** will not constitute a waiver of any other breach of any obligation, duty, or covenant of this **MOU**.
- **5.07** <u>Counterparts</u>: This **MOU** can be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which is declared an original.
- **5.08** <u>Severability</u>: If any clause or provision of this **MOU** is illegal, invalid or unenforceable under present or future law, **CITY** and **RATES/RGV** intend that the remaining clauses or provisions of this **MOU** will not be affected and will remain in full force and effect.

- **5.09** <u>Entire MOU</u>: This MOU contains the final and entire MOU between CITY and RATES/RGV, and will not be amended, explained, or superceded by any oral or written communications; unless done so in a subsequent, written, and mutually agreed upon amendment.
- **5.10** <u>Successors and Assigns</u>: All the obligations, duties, covenants, and rights contained in this **MOU** and performable by **CITY** will be applicable and binding upon respective successors and assigns, including any successor by merger or consolidation; however, nothing in this provision shall be construed to be consent of Assignment of this **MOU**.
- **5.11** <u>Nondiscrimination</u>: **CITY** and **RATES/RGV**, and their agents or employees, are prohibited from discriminating on the basis of race, color, sex, age, religion, national origin, or handicap, in the performance of the terms, conditions, covenants and obligations of this **MOU**.
- 5.12 <u>Dispute Resolution</u>:
 - A. Any controversy claim or dispute between **CITY** and **RATES/RGV** relating to the provisions of this **MOU** or the breach, termination or validity thereof shall, upon written request of any party, immediately be referred jointly for resolution of the controversy by non-binding mediation.
 - B. The mediation must be concluded within any period mutually agreed upon by the parties but in no event later than within forty-five (45) days after written notice is given by any party of its intent to proceed to mediation. Unless the parties expressly agree otherwise, each party shall bear its own costs, legal and expert fees incurred in the mediation, and evenly share the costs of the mediator. If after proceeding in good faith the parties, with the assistance of a neutral mediator, do not resolve the dispute within the forty-five (45) day period, the parties may proceed in accordance with paragraph (C) below.
 - C. After exhausting the procedures set forth above, either party may initiate litigation to resolve the dispute. The Law of the State of Texas shall control the matter in controversy. Venue is mandatory in Hidalgo County, Texas. Any notice of dispute tendered by **CITY** should be addressed to Jodi Lees, **RATES/RGV**.

Consideration and ACTION to keep the same water & wastewater rates.

This is an item that was asked to be placed on the agenda by Mr. Keillor. I had planned to address it as well. When this study was done in late 2016 and 2017 there was a lot of input by staff, our engineers, and Council for this study to be completed. Mr. Keillor indicated that we just paid a lot of money for some firm to give us information. That is far from accurate. Our staff, our engineers and Council were very involved. The consultant used information that we provide them on water usage, water meters, sewer treatment, sewer connections, payroll, all the different expenses, existing debt, current rates, current immediate needs for both water and sewer as well as projecting out for the next 10 years of needs with pretty accurate information that our engineers had spent a lot of time and money determining. We also used information on needs and upgrades that are required by TCEQ for the City to continue to operate. Additionally, when we have loans and grants with various agencies like we do with the Texas Water Development Board and the United States Department of Agriculture, a rate study has to be done by a private third party, not the City. During the working phase of our study, it was important to forecast capital improvements that need to be done to our system for the next 10 years. Fortunately we had spend about \$3,000,000 in grant and loan funds from TWDB over the last few years to have an accurate assessment of our system. They looked that the size, type of pipe and age of every water and wastewater line in the city as well pressure testes every wastewater line in the City. We had all of this information to utilize in this rate study and not just figures thrown out as Mr. Keillor suggested in his comments. As you can imagine these capital improvements are the main factor in rates. We as a staff had planned for be aggressive in the capital improvements so the initial rate structure was developed with that in mind. As we heard from the Council and residents we slowed the capital improvements down. The immediate needs were \$2,500,000 for water plant upgrades that are required by TCEQ, \$500,000 for water service from the Wal-Mart area to FM 1575 (required due to annexation), and \$1,000,000 for sewer service from the Walmart area to FM 1575 (required due to annexation). We also had water line upgrades for \$3,750,000 and sewer line upgrades for \$2,750,000 that were identified during our study. These 2 items have been delayed indefinitely. Then we moved the sewer plant upgrade of \$4,000,000 to the end of the 10 year period so it doesn't affect the rates instead of doing it sooner.

We have great water and sewer services for our residents at a very minimal cost regardless of what other entities charge. I could spend a lot to time showing rates that people pay for mobile phones, cable service, internet, gasoline, or a simple 20 ounce bottle of water that cost about \$1.50 but yet we offer 10,000 gallons of water for only \$57.51 and 5,000 gallons of sewer treatment for only \$38.98. For that kind of service it is extremely cheap as compared to any thing our residents purchase in a month.

Now in 2019 when rates are due to take a jump, we don't need to do that at this time since we have not borrowed the money yet. We had planned for that to happen in 2018. The needs are for the \$2,500,000 for water plant upgrades that are required by TCEQ, \$500,000 for water service

from the Wal-Mart area to FM 1575 (required due to annexation), and \$1,000,000 for sewer service from the Wal-mart area to FM 1575 (required due to annexation). We will have to do this in 2019 over the next 6 months. This will then require the rates to increase at the end of 2019 or preferably in March of 2020.

I recommend keeping the water and sewer rates the same as they are now.

One of the long term projects I was asked by the Council to look at is future annexations. I have looked at different options and feel there in no needed annexations at this time. This resolutions states our annexation plan which says we do not have plans but of course can change that at any time as the need arises. This also addresses voluntary annexations which means the City gets a request for us to annex a certain area. In that case we are free to do that through the proper procedures. The other type of annexation that we can do without it being in the plan is annexing less than 100 separate tracts of land. This is what we have done before. If we were ever to annex large areas over 100 separate tracts of land we would have to file an updated annexation plan that covers at least 3 years. Any annexation comes with costs and we need to continue to fulfill our obligations of past annexations before we do any more annexations.

As of now I recommend we approve this annexation plan and resolution that shows we have no plans to annex.

ANNEXATION PLAN 2019

1.6.2.b

The Local Government Code requires cities to prepare an annexation plan. Property can be annexed on the third anniversary of inclusion in the plan. The plan serves to provide a three-year notice to property owners of a city's intent to annex.

The statue provides several exceptions to the requirement for inclusion in an annexation plan. One exception exempts annexations that include fewer than 100 separate tracts of land on which one or more residential dwellings are located. Another exception exempts properties that petition for annexation.

The City's statutorily mandated Annexation Plan currently provides that the City has no plans for annexation of any property, except those areas that are exempt from the annexation plan requirements of Local Government Code. This plan is reviewed and updated as needed.

Pursuant to the Local Government Code, the City of Los Fresnos will only annex areas that are identified in this municipal annexation plan or are exempt from the provisions in the Code.

Areas specifically identified herein may be annexed on the third anniversary of the adoption date of this plan or on the third anniversary an amendment to include such area in this plan. Specific areas planned for adoption, if any are:

• None.

Other areas that may be considered for annexation by the City of Los Fresnos include only areas which are exempt from the Code including:

- Areas which contain fewer than 100 separate tracts of land on which one or more residential dwellings are located on each tract.
- Areas annexed by petition of more than 50 percent of the real property owners in the area proposed for annexation or by vote or petition of the qualified voters or real property owners.
- An area which is or was the subject of a strategic partnership agreement under the Code.
- An area annexed because the City Council of the City of Los Fresnos determines that annexation is necessary to protect the proposed area from:
 - Imminent destruction of property or injury to persons.
 - A condition or use that constitutes a public or private nuisance as defined by background principles of nuisance and property law of the State of Texas.

Following adoption of this municipal annexation plan by the Los Fresnos City Council, and so long as the City of Los Fresnos maintains an Internet website, the City of Los Fresnos will post and maintain on its Internet website:

- This municipal annexation plan.
- Any amendments to include an area in this municipal annexation plan until the date the area is annexed.
- Any amendments to remove an area from this municipal annexation plan until the date the area is again eligible for inclusion in the plan.

ACTION ITEM (ID # 2930)

Consideration and ACTION to approve to authorize the City Manager to work with the City Engineer to develop a street bid package for street repairs.

When the Council and the TIRZ Board approved the \$2,100,000 for street repairs and upgrades, the priority was that we would wait for bids to be received on Henderson Road before we move to other needed road improvements. The engineer's estimate is approximately \$1,200,000. With this is mind I think we need to move ahead with getting the other street projects done and not put it off any longer (I will continue to make Henderson Road Project the top priority). I have discussed the project with our City Engineer, Anna Smith with Hanson Professional Services. They will agree to do the engineering work and bid specifications needed for no more than 10% which is a great price. I have attached an updated list of streets that we should use and go as far as the funds will allow. The top needed streets have the most problems with having curbs that have rolled and pose a danger.

With that information, I recommend we set aside \$750,000 for these streets upgrades with no more than \$75,000 for engineering leaving \$675,000 for construction.

ACTION ITEM (ID # 2922)

Consideration and ACTION to approve the waiving of all sewer connection fees, water connections fees and utility expansion fees in lieu of the developer extending all utility infrastructure to the development.

Attached is information concerning the new development proposed on East Ocean Boulevard just past where Elva's Restaurant is on the east side of the drainage ditch. As you can see from the attached letter they are requesting water & sewer connection fees and the water utility expansion fees to be waived for their development. The estimated water connection fees will be \$53,400. The estimated sewer connection fees will be \$31,150. The estimated water utility expansion fees will be \$31,150. That is a total of \$115,700. The estimated total cost of the infrastructure for the development is \$812,620. Of that amount \$62,160 is for water infrastructure and \$122,865 is for sewer infrastructure totaling \$185,025. As you can see, the developer will spend much more than the amount of the fees to extend service. The City has approved to take similar action on other developments and sometimes partnered with the developer when there was mutual benefit like sharing in the cost of Veterans Memorial Drive or the extension of service benefited the city in general.

The City will still receive the cost for the building and construction fees and of course the monthly water, wastewater & garbage rates for actual usage along with the additional property tax change from exempt agriculture to developed property. When the developer puts in the water lines they will put the water taps and meters and meter boxes at the same time. I suggest the developer pay the cost amount for the meters and boxes since they are hard costs for the city. When the developer puts in the sewer lines they will put the same time.

This is a decision for the Council to make. If the Council is fine with waiving the fees, I recommend the developer still be required to purchase the water meters and water boxes at cost and install them. This will eliminate that cost from the city and labor for us to install them since we are not getting the fees.

Consideration and ACTION to approve Ordinance 498amending chapter 28, "Nuisances", section 28-25 "Weeds and Vegetation" by adding the establishing fees and regulations for lot mowing work performed by the city.

Unfortunately not all property owners mow and take care of their property. When they don't, our code enforcement officer goes by to notify the property owner in person or by mail. If they don't take care of it we have a contractor that does the work. We then bill the property owner for the work done as well as the city time it took to get this done. If the property owner does not pay the bill, after it accumulates to \$500 we place a lien on the property. This has been the practice for many years but it was an internal policy. We felt it was important to make it part of the ordinance approved by the Council. The \$500 amount is appropriate instead of each invoice since there is a cost to prepared the filing of the lien by the attorney and the filing costs by the county. At this time we do not issue a citation to the property owner like some of the other cities do. We could if the Council felt it appropriate.

I recommend approval of the change indicated in yellow under (d).

Sec. 28-25. - Weeds and vegetation.

- (a) It is unlawful for any person owning, claiming, occupying or having supervision or control of any real property, occupied or unoccupied, within the corporate limits of the city, to permit weeds, brush, or any objectionable or unsightly matter to grow to a greater height than 12 inches upon such real property within 150 feet of any property line which abuts street rights-of-way, alleys, utility easements, subdivided additions, developed property or any buildings or other structures. It shall be the duty of such person to keep the area from the line of his property to the curbline next adjacent to it, if there is a curbline, and, if not, then to the centerline of the adjacent unpaved street, or to the edge of the pavement, cleared of the matter referred to in this subsection.
- (b) All vegetation (including hay, unless the hay is cultivated on property which has been granted an agricultural property tax exemption on the most recent tax roll as certified by the county appraisal district), except regularly cultivated row crops, and which exceed 12 inches in height, shall be presumed to be objectionable and unsightly matter; provided further that regularly cultivated row crops shall not be allowed to grow within the right-of-way of any public street or easement nor shall they be allowed to obstruct the necessary view to and from adjacent rights-of-way, but shall be kept mowed as provided in this article.
- (c) With respect to lots, tracts or parcels of land of five or more acres, the provisions of this section shall not apply to any area greater than 150 feet from any open public street or thoroughfare, as measured from the right-of-way line of said street or thoroughfare, and greater than 150 feet from any adjacent property under different ownership and on which

any building is located or on which any improvement exists, as measured from the property line.

(d) The work performed to cut the Nuisance Vegetation on the property will be assessed for the actual cost of service plus the contractor fees, as per the fee schedule. These fees represent the City's time for inspections and notice to the Owner. An invoice to the Owner will include the amount due for the work performed, the administrative fee, the contractor fees, and state that the Owner has 30 days from the date of the assessment invoice to pay for the balance. A property lien in the public records will be filed if a balance of \$500 is accumulated. Lien fees will be invoiced to the property Owner separately according to Cameron County fee schedule.

A. Wastewater Plant Update - Construction is ongoing for the sludge project. The plans and documents were sent to TWDB on December the 5th for the chlorine contact basin. The plans and documents were sent to TWDB on December 12th for the headworks project. Once these are approve by TWDB we can advertise for bids.

B. Water Plant Update - We have approval from TCEQ and TWDB to proceed with working to get the upgrades done on the water plant and distribution lines. It is included in the study under C.

C. Water & Wastewater Engineering Study - The water & wastewater portions have been approved by TCEQ and TWDB. The Council approved asking for about \$1,600,000 to fix 3 lift stations, run sewer service to the new annexed areas on West Highway 100, replace some old manholes and replace some old sewer lines. There are no grants available for this but we can probably get a low interest loan. The intent will be to do this with no increase in sewer rates. The amounts we can save on repairs can go towards the loan payment. The Council approved the upgrades needed at the water plant and water system for \$3,700,000. We will look for funding for these 2 projects.

D. Whipple Road Wastewater Extension - Hanson Professional Services has the documents ready for us to advertise, bid, award contract and begin construction. The City has to acquire the easements prior to that. I have not had time to work on these easements. I have this as a goal to complete by the end of January but did not meet this goal as I was concentrating on the Henderson Road Project.

E. Nature Park - We are working with TPW on what remaining funds are available so we will know what to include on the last phase of work. We have already committed to the playground in the amount of \$85,000.

F. Hike & Bike Trails - We finally got an email confirming the environmental from TxDot is clear and approved. We are waiting for an official letter. This will release the \$200,000 TPW grant funds. Once we have that in hand, Halff Associates will finalize the plans and bid

specifications. Once that is done we can bid the project. I do not want to put a time line on it yet since we don't have the letter. I have contacted the Legacy Foundation about their grant of \$500,000 for the project and the funds are still waiting on us.

G. CDBG 2017-2018 Grant - This is to upgrade drainage on Ash Street, Ebony Street and Pecan Street along the canal as well as on East Sixth Street and Ebano Street. Most of the drainage work is almost complete. They will start on the paving soon.

H. Henderson Road Project - I met with Ambiotec to let them know of the concerns and additional information we would like to have on the project before we move forward. They are working on that information and hopefully I will get it back soon. At that time (if the information is complete) I will be ready to hold a meeting with anyone that wants to review the project. This information will allow me to finalize potential deals for the 10 feet needed with several of the adjoining property owners. Hanson Professional Services, our City Engineer, is working on some sewer sizing of pipes for the southeast section of the east Resaca crossing that is needed to provide for another property owner that has 3 of the adjoining properties. I have 2 proposals to submit at the meeting in February in closed session. I have made contact with 9 of the 10 property owners. The last property owner will be contacted once I get the information back from the engineer.

I. City Hall Project - Work is continuing.

J. Building Inspections - The potential candidate that we were working with did not work out. We have advertised this and worked on this for a very long time. I propose to discontinue this for now. Luis Ramos has done an excellent job. Our contractors and builders know what to expect from him and when to expect it. While some feel the price is too high, I feel it is more that worth it knowing we have consistent professional inspections that are always according to code and by the book. I am proud of that.

K. Underground Canal - We have applied for the grant as directed by the Council in January. I have also visited with Cameron County Irrigation District #10 about the project. There seems to be a dispute between them and Bayview Irrigation District #11 about ownership of the canal. District 11 says they own the whole canal and District 10 says they each own half of the canal. Both are good with our project so we can proceed.

L. Dog Park - Wal-Mart is interested in moving this project forward. I had a discussion with their engineer and planner 2 weeks ago. He said they dropped the ball and he will see where the potential project sits. If he hasn't called by the end of February I will make contact again.

M. Update Planning & Zoning Ordinance - Municode is looking at our existing ordinance to see what they suggest.

N. Economic Development - Retail Coach is out promoting the city to different retailers. The have had some good discussions with several potential retailers but nothing firm to report.

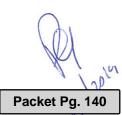

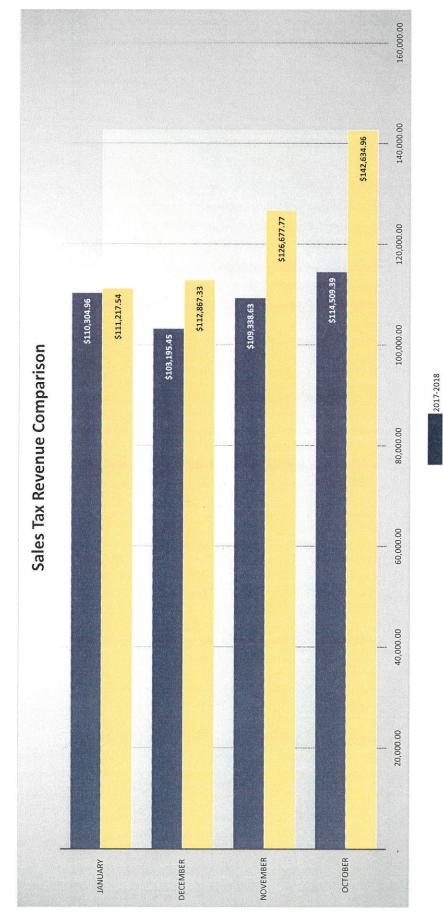

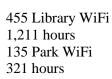
