

This is to hear from the public on disannexing this property. It is located just to the west of Las Palmas Housing and east of FM 803 on the north side of Highway 100.




This is to listen to comments from the public on this issue.





3.0 PUBLIC EDUCATION, OUTREACH, AND INVOLVEMENT

The following section presents the permit requirement for the Public Education, Outreach, and Involvement Program. The section describes the existing BMPs necessary to implement this program. It describes the measureable goals for each BMP and a timeline (or frequency) for each implementation action. Each of these sections includes a brief discussion of current programs, a description of the BMPs selected for each MCM, a proposed implementation schedule for each BMP, and performance measures for the programs.

3.1 Public Education, Outreach, and Involvement Permit Text

The BMPs listed in this section were selected to meet the following regulatory requirement (Minimum Control Measure #1):

- 1. Public Education, Outreach, and Involvement
 - (a) Public Education and Outreach
 - (1) All permittees shall develop, implement, and maintain a comprehensive stormwater education and outreach program to educate public employees, businesses, and the general public of hazards associated with the illegal discharges and improper disposal of waste and about the impact that stormwater discharges can have on local waterways, as well as the steps that the public can take to reduce pollutants in stormwater.
 - Existing permittees shall assess program elements that were described in the previous permit, modify as necessary, and develop and implement new elements, as necessary, to continue reducing the discharge of pollutants from the MS4 to the MEP. New elements must be fully implemented by the end of this permit term and newly regulated permittees shall have the program fully implemented by the end of this permit term. The program must, at a minimum:
 - a. Define the goals and objectives of the program based on high priority community-wide issues (for example, reduction of nitrogen in discharges from the small MS4, promoting previous techniques used in the small MS4, or improving the quality of discharges to the Edwards Aquifer);
 - b. Identify the target audience(s);
 - Develop or utilize appropriate educational materials, such as printed materials, billboard and mass transit advertisements, signage at select locations, radio advertisements, television advertisements, and websites;
 - d. Determine cost effective and practical methods and procedures for distribution of materials.
 - (2) Throughout the permit term, all permittees shall make the educational materials available to convey the program's message to the target audience(s) at least annually.
 - (3) All permittees shall review and update as necessary, the SWMP and MCM implementation procedures required by Part III.A.2.. Any changes must be reflected in the annual report. Such written procedures must be maintained, either on site or in the SWMP and made available for inspection by the TCEQ.
 - (4) MS4 operators may partner with other MS4 operators to maximize the program and cost effectiveness of the required outreach.
 - (b) Public Involvement

All permittees shall involve the public, and, at minimum, comply with any state and local public notice requirements in the planning and implementation activities related to developing and implementing the SWMP, except that correctional facilities are not required to implement this portion of the MCM.

Existing permittees shall assess program elements that were described in the previous permit, modify as necessary, and develop and implement new elements, as necessary, to continue reducing the discharge of pollutants from the MS4 to the MEP. New elements must be fully implemented by the end of this permit term and newly regulated permittees shall have the program fully implemented by the end of this permit term. At a minimum, all permittees shall:

- (1) If feasible, consider using public input (for example, the opportunity for public comment, or public meetings) in the implementation of the program;
- (2) If feasible, create opportunities for citizens to participate in the implementation of control measures, such as stream clean-ups, storm drain stenciling, volunteer monitoring, volunteer "Adopt-A-Highway" programs, and educational activities;
- (3) Ensure the public can easily find information about the SWMP.

3.2.1 Utility Bill Inserts, self service materials and/or mailouts

Outreach materials in the forms of small brochures, informative handouts or fact sheets will continue to be distributed with municipal water utility bills and/or mailouts as budget allows. This BMP program will be expanded to include a self-service area located in a public facility (library, city hall, main office, etc.) where community members, visitors, students, and other individuals can obtain outreach materials like brochures, announcements and factsheets. Information shall include various topics like waste oil disposal, use of pesticides and fertilizers on landscaping, household hazardous waste, water quality, and the SWMP in general. The MS4 will develop this program using existing outreach materials developed by the LTSTF, TCEQ, EPA and other organizations.

3.2.3 Classroom Presentations

A curriculum with associated materials and training is available and advertised to classroom teachers from various ISDs located within jurisdictions of MS4 stakeholders. Program materials include curriculum on water quality and water conservation, stormwater pollution prevention, and promotion of the SWMP. Classroom visits are conducted by the MS4 that include guest speakers.

The MS4 will also promote the Arroyo Colorado Watershed Protection Plan (ACWPP) and work with the ACWP to promote mutually beneficial goals. A watershed model, a rain harvesting model, a pervious parking lot model developed by the ACWP and/or the LTSTF are available to the MS4s and the school districts. The BMP will be expanded to include production of a monthly report that will include school visited, activity conducted and number of individuals outreached.

3.2.4 Stenciling

A successful storm drain stenciling program was initiated by the LTSTF during the last permit period. Using grant funding and local funding local government staff provided stormwater education programs and facilitated storm drain stenciling activities with youth and citizens' organizations, and as part of their stormwater management program. The LTSTF will continue to facilitate the development of partnerships with local youth service groups to perform a significant portion of the storm drain stenciling work as needed. These groups may include the Boys & Girls Clubs, Boy Scouts of America, and local environmental groups. The stencil will include the logo of the LRGV TPDES Task Force, the ACWP, and/or the MS4.

3.2.5 Brochures and Videos

The LTSTF has produced various brochures during the previous permit period and successfully delivered to the region. Samples of brochures have routinely been submitted to the TCEQ via the annual reporting process. Topics include soil erosion prevention, rain harvesting, low impact development, and Arroyo Colorado watershed protection topics. *After the Storm, No La Riegues, Chucho Salva el Dia* and similar video campaigns initiated by the EPA have been adopted by the LTSTF. Dozens of videos (PSA format) have been developed by the LTSTF and delivered to the region using public access Channels using Time Warner Channel 17 (local school district television), local government networks (Channel 12), websites and You Tube. The PSA program includes customized projects, i.e. documentary and 30-second clips in English and Spanish. The LTSTF will continue this outreach and will expand the effort by developing new customized PSAs during the permit period. Additional brochures will be developed. Similar delivery tools will be utilized. This BMP also has used self-service stations (public-owned facility lobbies), libraries and outreach events to deliver information.

3.2.6 Signage

Stormwater pollution prevention signs were designed, produced and installed along major intersections within the MS4 membership of the LTSTF. The signs bear the logos from the LTSTF, the ACWP and the MS4. Signage were placed throughout the region at locations where pedestrians and vehicle drivers will recognize the sign as an indicator of a local water body that should be protected, the importance of water quality, and the potential effects of stormwater pollution. 3.2.7 Community Outreach

The LTSTF has provided educational and outreach materials to the community, including brochures, fact sheets and handouts. 3.2.11 Hotline

A Stormwater Hotline has been developed and implemented by the majority of the MS4s to promote outreach, enforce policy and to facilitate public involvement. The hotline is used for reporting illicit and illegal connections and discharges, illegal dumping, emergency and non-emergency incidents and other stormwater related activities. The hotline operator provides readily-available information and direction for further communication if warranted, direct notifications to the proper authorities, and record feedback, comments and recommendations. Several MS4s do not have the capability to isolate a hotline, but use either police or fire dispatch capability during off-hours to promote stormwater policy and related mitigate issues. This BMP will be further assessed.

City of Los Fresnos Stormwater Team

Some of the duties that the Stormwater section of the Public Works department does is keep up with Public Outreach. Public Outreach is done mainly through various mail outs and a great example of it is through our utility bills or Consumer Confidence Report sent out regularly to our customers. We provide helpful tips on how our citizens can help prevent Stormwater pollution from going into our drains that eventually empty out to our Resaca's and head towards the Laguna Madre or Brownsville Ship Channel. In our mail outs we also provide helpful links to resources available on the EPA and TCEQ websites.

Other forms of Public Outreach is done by our custom rack cards available at City Hall, the Library, and at the Public Works office. These informative cards also provide our emergency telephone line for concerns or questions that any might have on our Stormwater program.

Another form of Public Outreach is accomplished by signage and by marking the inlets with stenciling or attaching button markers that remind folks that pouring hazardous liquids or debris down the inlet will affect our waterways.

Other duties that the Stormwater team tackles is making sure our Stormwater inlets are free of debris so that no polluted runoff enters our drains. The City has invested in a street sweeper that regularly sweeps our City streets to help control the amount of sediment that will enter our drain inlets when it rains. The sediment, however small, has a great impact on the water quality of our waterways once it is in our separate sewer system. Inspection of the inlets also includes looking for illicit discharges that are caused by a point source (has a direct source) or nonpoint source (usually a pipe that gathers Stormwater from many locations). An example of an illicit discharge would be finding water running toward a drain in a perfectly sunny day where it has not rained in a while. Tracing the source will help eliminate potential pollution going into our drains.

The Stormwater section of the City is primarily handled by the Public Works department but all City employees are involved in helping keep our waterways clean. We all report any illicit discharges, potential pollution areas, and obstructed drain inlets to the Stormwater Team. The Stormwater section of the City is a fairly small group but has a huge impact in helping keep our environment clean for the future citizens of the City of Los Fresnos.


COVID-19 POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

Employees shall report any close contact with known COVID-19 positive individuals or suspected positives, as well as any personal symptoms to Department Heads or City Manager. Complete honesty is required to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Symptoms can include cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, loss of taste or smell, diarrhea, or feeling feverish or measured temperature or 100.0 or more.

FACIAL COVERINGS AND SOCIAL DISTANCING IS RECOMMENDED

It is recommended for all City employees and members of the public to utilize face coverings while on City premises and cannot maintain social distancing. Face coverings are considered personal protection equipment (PPE) and play a significant role in preventing the spread of COVID-19. A facial covering means a material that extends over the mouth and nose completely. Young children (10 years of age or younger) and persons who are unable to adjust or remove face coverings should not be regarded as suitable candidates for wearing face coverings. In this case, the decision is up to the individual or their parent, guardian or attendant. Social distancing means keeping a minimum of 6 feet of separation in all directions from another individual.

The City will follow the latest guidelines regarding quarantine isolation and vaccine requirements set by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention and the State of Texas.





COVID-19

Stay Up to Date with Your Vaccines

Updated Jan. 16, 2022

Get Vaccinated and Stay Up to Date

Up to date means a person has received all recommended COVID-19 vaccines, including any booster dose(s) when eligible.

Fully vaccinated means a person has received their primary series of COVID-19 vaccines.

COVID-19 Vaccines

COVID-19 vaccines available in the United States are effective at protecting people from getting seriously ill, getting hospitalized, and even dying. As with vaccines for other diseases, people who are up to date are optimally protected. CDC recommends that everyone 5 years and older get their primary series of COVID-19 vaccines, and receive a booster dose when eligible.

When Are You Up to Date?

You are up to date with your COVID-19 vaccines when you have followed the current recommendations listed below. The recommendations will be different depending on your age, your health status, and when you first got vaccinated.

Many people who are immunocompromised may need an additional dose as part of their primary vaccine series.

Note that booster shots are not recommended for everyone at this time.

¹ If you had a severe allergic reaction after a previous dose or if you have a known (diagnosed) allergy to a COVID-19 vaccine ingredient, you should not get that vaccine. If you have been instructed not to get one type of COVID-19 vaccine, you may still be able to get another type.



Calculating Isolation

Day 0 is your first day of symptoms or a positive viral test. Day 1 is the first full day after your symptoms developed or your test specimen was collected. If you have COVID-19 or have symptoms, isolate for at least 5 days.

IF YOU Tested positive for COVID-19 or have symptoms, regardless of vaccination status

Stay home for at least 5 days

Stay home for 5 days and isolate from others in your home.

Wear a well-fitted mask if you must be around others in your home.

Do not travel.

Ending isolation if you had symptoms

End isolation after 5 full days if you are fever-free for 24 hours (without the use of fever-reducing medication) and your symptoms are improving.

Ending isolation if you did NOT have symptoms End isolation after at least

5 full days after your positive test.

If you were severely ill with COVID-19 or are immunocompromised

You should isolate for at least 10 days. Consult your doctor before ending isolation.

Take precautions until day 10

Wear a mask

Wear a well-fitted mask for 10 full days any time you are around others inside your home or in public. Do not go to places where you are unable to wear a mask.

Do not travel

Do not travel until a full 10 days after your symptoms started or the date your positive test was taken if you had no symptoms.

Avoid being around people who are at high risk

Exposure

Contact with someone infected with SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, in a way that increases the likelihood of getting infected with the virus.

Close Contact

A close contact is someone who was less than 6 feet away from an infected person (laboratory-confirmed or a clinical diagnosis) for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period. For example, three individual 5-minute exposures for a total of 15 minutes. People who are exposed to someone with COVID-19 after they completed at least 5 days of isolation are not considered close contacts.

Quarantine

Quarantine is a strategy used to prevent transmission of COVID-19 by keeping people who have been in close contact with someone with COVID-19 apart from others.

Who does not need to quarantine?

If you had close contact with someone with COVID-19 and you are in one of the following groups, you **do not need to quarantine**.

- You are up to date with your COVID-19 vaccines.
- You had confirmed COVID-19 within the last 90 days (meaning you tested positive using a viral test).

You should wear a well-fitting mask around others for 10 days from the date of your last close contact with someone with COVID-19 (the date of last close contact is considered day 0). Get tested at least 5 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19. If you test positive or develop COVID-19 symptoms, isolate from other people and follow recommendations in the Isolation section below. If you tested positive for COVID-19 with a viral test within the previous 90 days and subsequently recovered and remain without COVID-19 symptoms, you do not need to quarantine or get tested after close contact. You should wear a well-fitting mask around others for 10 days from the date of your last close contact with someone with COVID-19 (the date of last close contact is considered day 0).

Who should quarantine?

If you come into close contact with someone with COVID-19, you should quarantine if you are not up to date on COVID-19 vaccines. This includes people who are not vaccinated.

What to do for quarantine

- Stay home and away from other people for at least 5 days (day 0 through day 5) after your last contact with a person who has COVID-19. The date of your exposure is considered day 0. Wear a well-fitting mask when around others at home, if possible.
- For 10 days after your last close contact with someone with COVID-19, watch for fever (100.4°F or greater), cough, shortness of breath, or other COVID-19 symptoms.
- If you develop symptoms, get tested immediately and isolate until you receive your test results. If you test positive, follow isolation recommendations.
- If you do not develop symptoms, get tested at least 5 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19.
 - If you test negative, you can leave your home, but continue to wear a well-fitting mask when around others at home
 and in public until 10 days after your last close contact with someone with COVID-19.
 - If you test positive, you should isolate for at least 5 days from the date of your positive test (if you do not have symptoms). If you do develop COVID-19 symptoms, isolate for at least 5 days from the date your symptoms began (the date the symptoms started is day 0). Follow recommendations in the isolation section below.
 - If you are unable to get a test 5 days after last close contact with someone with COVID-19, you can leave your home
 after day 5 if you have been without COVID-19 symptoms throughout the 5-day period. Wear a well-fitting mask for

10 days after your date of last close contact when around others at home and in public.

- Avoid people who are immunocompromised or at high risk for severe disease, and nursing homes and other highrisk settings, until after at least 10 days.
- If possible, stay away from people you live with, especially people who are at higher risk for getting very sick from COVID-19, as well as others outside your home throughout the full 10 days after your last close contact with someone with COVID-19.
- If you are unable to quarantine, you should wear a well-fitting mask for 10 days when around others at home and in public.
- If you are unable to wear a mask when around others, you should continue to quarantine for 10 days. Avoid people who are immunocompromised or at high risk for severe disease, and nursing homes and other high-risk settings, until after at least 10 days.
- See additional information about travel.
- Do not go to places where you are unable to wear a mask, such as restaurants and some gyms, and avoid eating around
 others at home and at work until after 10 days after your last close contact with someone with COVID-19.

After quarantine

- Watch for symptoms until 10 days after your last close contact with someone with COVID-19.
- If you have symptoms, isolate immediately and get tested.

Quarantine in high-risk congregate settings

In certain congregate settings that have high risk of secondary transmission (such as correctional and detention facilities, homeless shelters, or cruise ships), CDC recommends a 10-day quarantine for residents, regardless of vaccination and booster status. During periods of critical staffing shortages, facilities may consider shortening the quarantine period for staff to ensure continuity of operations. Decisions to shorten quarantine in these settings should be made in consultation with state, local, tribal, or territorial health departments and should take into consideration the context and characteristics of the facility. CDC's setting-specific guidance provides additional recommendations for these settings.

Isolation

Isolation is used to separate people with confirmed or suspected COVID-19 from those without COVID-19. People who are in isolation should stay home until it's safe for them to be around others. At home, anyone sick or infected should separate from others, or wear a well-fitting mask when they need to be around others. People in isolation should stay in a specific "sick room" or area and use a separate bathroom if available. Everyone who has presumed or confirmed COVID-19 should stay home and isolate from other people for at least 5 full days (day 0 is the first day of symptoms or the date of the day of the positive viral test for asymptomatic persons). They should wear a mask when around others at home and in public for an additional 5 days. People who are confirmed to have COVID-19 or are showing symptoms of COVID-19 need to isolate regardless of their vaccination status. This includes:

- People who have a positive viral test for COVID-19, regardless of whether or not they have symptoms.
- People with symptoms of COVID-19, including people who are awaiting test results or have not been tested. People with symptoms should isolate even if they do not know if they have been in close contact with someone with COVID-19.

What to do for isolation

- Monitor your symptoms. If you have an emergency warning sign (including trouble breathing), seek emergency medical
 care immediately.
- Stay in a separate room from other household members, if possible.
- Use a separate bathroom, if possible.
- Take steps to improve ventilation at home, if possible.
- Avoid contact with other members of the household and pets.

- Don't share personal household items, like cups, towels, and utensils.
- Wear a well-fitting mask when you need to be around other people.

Learn more about what to do if you are sick and how to notify your contacts.

Ending isolation for people who had COVID-19 and had symptoms

If you had COVID-19 and had symptoms, isolate for at least 5 days. To calculate your 5-day isolation period, day 0 is your first day of symptoms. Day 1 is the first full day after your symptoms developed. You can leave isolation after 5 full days.

- You can end isolation after 5 full days if you are fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication and your other symptoms have improved (Loss of taste and smell may persist for weeks or months after recovery and need not delay the end of isolation).
- You should continue to wear a well-fitting mask around others at home and in public for 5 additional days (day 6 through day 10) after the end of your 5-day isolation period. If you are unable to wear a mask when around others, you should continue to isolate for a full 10 days. Avoid people who are immunocompromised or at high risk for severe disease, and nursing homes and other high-risk settings, until after at least 10 days.
- If you continue to have fever or your other symptoms have not improved after 5 days of isolation, you should wait to end your isolation until you are fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication and your other symptoms have improved. Continue to wear a well-fitting mask. Contact your healthcare provider if you have guestions.
- · See additional information about travel.
- Do not go to places where you are unable to wear a mask, such as restaurants and some gyms, and avoid eating around others at home and at work until a full 10 days after your first day of symptoms.

If an individual has access to a test and wants to test, the best approach is to use an antigen test¹ towards the end of the 5-day isolation period. Collect the test sample only if you are fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication and your other symptoms have improved (loss of taste and smell may persist for weeks or months after recovery and need not delay the end of isolation). If your test result is positive, you should continue to isolate until day 10. If your test result is negative, you can end isolation, but continue to wear a well-fitting mask around others at home and in public until day 10. Follow additional recommendations for masking and avoiding travel as described above.

¹As noted in the labeling for authorized over-the counter antigen tests : Negative results should be treated as presumptive. Negative results do not rule out SARS-CoV-2 infection and should not be used as the sole basis for treatment or patient management decisions, including infection control decisions. To improve results, antigen tests should be used twice over a three-day period with at least 24 hours and no more than 48 hours between tests.

Note that these recommendations on ending isolation **do not** apply to people with moderate or severe COVID-19 or with weakened immune systems (immunocompromised). See section below for recommendations for when to end isolation for these groups.

Ending isolation for people who tested positive for COVID-19 but had no symptoms

If you test positive for COVID-19 and never develop symptoms, isolate for at least 5 days. Day 0 is the day of your positive viral test (based on the date you were tested) and day 1 is the first full day after the specimen was collected for your positive test. You can leave isolation after 5 full days.

- If you continue to have no symptoms, you can end isolation after at least 5 days.
- You should continue to wear a well-fitting mask around others at home and in public until day 10 (day 6 through day 10).
 If you are unable to wear a mask when around others, you should continue to isolate for 10 days. Avoid people who are immunocompromised or at high risk for severe disease, and nursing homes and other high-risk settings, until after at least 10 days.

- If you develop symptoms after testing positive, your 5-day isolation period should start over. Day 0 is your first day of
 symptoms. Follow the recommendations above for ending isolation for people who had COVID-19 and had symptoms.
- See additional information about travel.
- Do not go to places where you are unable to wear a mask, such as restaurants and some gyms, and avoid eating around others at home and at work until 10 days after the day of your positive test.

If an individual has access to a test and wants to test, the best approach is to use an antigen test¹ towards the end of the 5-day isolation period. If your test result is positive, you should continue to isolate until day 10. If your test result is negative, you can end isolation, but continue to wear a well-fitting mask around others at home and in public until day 10. Follow additional recommendations for masking and avoiding travel as described above.

¹As noted in the labeling for authorized over-the counter antigen tests [3]: Negative results should be treated as presumptive. Negative results do not rule out SARS-CoV-2 infection and should not be used as the sole basis for treatment or patient management decisions, including infection control decisions. To improve results, antigen tests should be used twice over a three-day period with at least 24 hours and no more than 48 hours between tests.

Ending isolation for people who were severely ill with COVID-19 or have a weakened immune system (immunocompromised)

People who are severely ill with COVID-19 (including those who were hospitalized or required intensive care or ventilation support) and people with compromised immune systems might need to isolate at home longer. They may also require testing with a viral test to determine when they can be around others. CDC recommends an isolation period of at least 10 and up to 20 days for people who were severely ill with COVID-19 and for people with weakened immune systems. Consult with your healthcare provider about when you can resume being around other people.

People who are immunocompromised should talk to their healthcare provider about the potential for reduced immune responses to COVID-19 vaccines and the need to continue to follow current prevention measures (including wearing a well-fitting mask, staying 6 feet apart from others they don't live with, and avoiding crowds and poorly ventilated indoor spaces) to protect themselves against COVID-19 until advised otherwise by their healthcare provider. Close contacts of immunocompromised people—including household members—should also be encouraged to receive all recommended COVID-19 vaccine doses to help protect these people.

Isolation in high-risk congregate settings

In certain high-risk congregate settings that have high risk of secondary transmission and where it is not feasible to cohort people (such as correctional and detention facilities, homeless shelters, and cruise ships), CDC recommends a 10-day isolation period for residents. During periods of critical staffing shortages, facilities may consider shortening the isolation period for staff to ensure continuity of operations. Decisions to shorten isolation in these settings should be made in consultation with state, local, tribal, or territorial health departments and should take into consideration the context and characteristics of the facility. CDC's setting-specific guidance provides additional recommendations for these settings.

This CDC guidance is meant to supplement—not replace—any federal, state, local, territorial, or tribal health and safety laws, rules, and regulations.

Ongoing COVID-19 Exposure FAQs

I live with someone with COVID-19, but I cannot be separated from them. How do we manage quarantine in this situation?

It is very important for people with COVID-19 to remain apart from other people, if possible, even if they are living together. If separation of the person with COVID-19 from others that they live with is not possible, the other people that they live with will have *ongoing* exposure, meaning they will be repeatedly exposed until that person is no longer able to spread the virus to other people. In this situation, there are precautions you can take to limit the spread of COVID-19:

- The person with COVID-19 and everyone they live with should wear a well-fitting mask inside the home.
- If possible, one person should care for the person with COVID-19 to limit the number of people who are in close contact with the infected person.
- Take steps to protect yourself and others to reduce transmission in the home:
 - Quarantine if you are not up to date with your COVID-19 vaccines.
 - Isolate if you are sick or tested positive for COVID-19, even if you don't have symptoms.
 - Learn more about the public health recommendations for testing, mask use and quarantine of close contacts, like yourself, who have ongoing exposure. These recommendations differ depending on your vaccination status.

What should I do if I have ongoing exposure to COVID-19 from someone I live with?

Recommendations for this situation depend on your vaccination status:

If you are not up to date on COVID-19 vaccines and have ongoing exposure to COVID-19, you should:

- Begin quarantine immediately and continue to quarantine throughout the isolation period of the person with COVID-19.
- Continue to quarantine for an additional 5 days starting the day *after* the end of isolation for the person with COVID-19.
- Get tested at least 5 days after the end of isolation of the infected person that lives with them.
 - If you test negative, you can leave the home but should continue to wear a well-fitting mask when around
 others at home and in public until 10 days after the end of isolation for the person with COVID-19.
- Isolate immediately if you develop symptoms of COVID-19 or test positive.

If you are up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and have ongoing exposure to COVID-19, you should:

Get tested at least 5 days after your first exposure. A person with COVID-19 is considered infectious starting 2
days before they develop symptoms, or 2 days before the date of their positive test if they do not have
symptoms.

Get tested again at least 5 days after the end of isolation for the person with COVID-19.

- Wear a well-fitting mask when you are around the person with COVID-19, and do this throughout their isolation period.
- Wear a well-fitting mask around others for 10 days after the infected person's isolation period ends.

Isolate immediately if you develop symptoms of COVID-19 or test positive.

What should I do if multiple people I live with test positive for COVID-19 at different times?

Recommendations for this situation depend on your vaccination status:

- If you are not up to date with your COVID-19 vaccines, you should:
 - Quarantine throughout the isolation period of any infected person that you live with.
 - Continue to quarantine until 5 days after the end of isolation date for the most recently infected person
 that lives with you. For example, if the last day of isolation of the person most recently infected with
 COVID-19 was June 30, the new 5-day quarantine period starts on July 1.
 - Get tested at least 5 days after the end of isolation for the most recently infected person that lives with you.
 - Wear a well-fitting mask when you are around any person with COVID-19 while that person is in isolation.
 - Wear a well-fitting mask when you are around other people until 10 days after your last close contact.
 - Isolate immediately if you develop symptoms of COVID-19 or test positive.
- If you are up to date with COVID-19 your vaccines , you should:
 - Get tested at least 5 days after your first exposure. A person with COVID-19 is considered infectious starting 2 days before they developed symptoms, or 2 days before the date of their positive test if they do not have symptoms.
 - Get tested again at least 5 days after the end of isolation for the most recently infected person that lives with you.
 - Wear a well-fitting mask when you are around any person with COVID-19 while that person is in isolation.
 - Wear a well-fitting mask around others for 10 days after the end of isolation for the most recently
 infected person that lives with you. For example, if the last day of isolation for the person most recently
 infected with COVID-19 was June 30, the new 10-day period to wear a well-fitting mask indoors in public
 starts on July 1.
 - Isolate immediately if you develop symptoms of COVID-19 or test positive.

I had COVID-19 and completed isolation. Do I have to quarantine or get tested if someone I live with gets COVID-19 shortly after I completed isolation?

No. If you recently completed isolation and someone that lives with you tests positive for the virus that causes COVID-19 shortly after the end of your isolation period, you do not have to quarantine or get tested as long as you do not develop new symptoms. Once all of the people that live together have completed isolation or quarantine, refer to the guidance below for new exposures to COVID-19.

- If you had COVID-19 in the previous 90 days and then came into close contact with someone with COVID-19, you do not have to quarantine or get tested if you do not have symptoms. But you should:
 - Wear a well-fitting mask indoors in public for 10 days after exposure.
 - Monitor for COVID-19 symptoms and isolate immediately if symptoms develop.

- Consult with a healthcare provider for testing recommendations if new symptoms develop.
- If more than 90 days have passed since your recovery from infection, follow CDC's recommendations for close contacts. These recommendations will differ depending on your vaccination status.

COVID-19 POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

Employees shall report any close contact with known COVID-19 positive individuals or suspected positives, as well as any personal symptoms to Department Heads or City Manager. Complete honesty is required to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Employees will be required to test for COVID-19 if they have symptoms or have been high risk exposed. Symptoms can include cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, loss of taste or smell, diarrhea, or feeling feverish or measured temperature or 100.0 or more.

FACIAL COVERINGS AND SOCIAL DISTANCING IS RECOMMENDED

It is recommended for all City employees and members of the public to utilize face coverings while on City premises and cannot maintain social distancing. Face coverings are considered personal protection equipment (PPE) and play a significant role in preventing the spread of COVID-19. Department heads are authorized to discipline employees for failure to comply. A facial covering means a material that extends over the mouth and nose completely. Young children (10 years of age or younger) and persons who are unable to adjust or remove face coverings should not be regarded as suitable candidates for wearing face coverings. In this case, the decision is up to the individual or their parent, guardian or attendant. Social distancing means keeping a minimum of 6 feet of separation in all directions from another individual.

MINIMUM STANDARD HEALTH PROTOCOLS

- 1. An employee that has tested positive for COVID-19 may not return to work until all four of the criteria have been met:
 - At least 3 days (72 hours) have passed without fever (without using fever reducing medication)
 - o Individual has improvement in symptoms (cough, shortness of breath, etc)
 - o At least ten (10) days have passed since symptoms first appeared; and
 - o Is cleared by Cameron County Health Department
- 2. If the Employee has had symptoms that could be COVID-19 and wants to return to work before completing the self-isolation period as seen above, the individual must:
 - Obtain a medical professional's note clearing the individual to return to work based on an alternative diagnosis.
- 3. An employee that has had known low risk exposure (within 6 feet but has face covering, beyond 6 feet but in the general area for less than 10 minutes with no face covering or not exposed to cough or sneeze) close contact with a person who is lab confirmed to have COVID-19 may continue to remain at work and continue normal work schedule.

- 4. An employee that has had known high risk exposure (within 6 feet without face covering, beyond 6 feet but in the general area for more than 10 minutes with no face covering or exposed to cough or sneeze) close contact with a person who is lab confirmed to have COVID-19 may not report to work until:
 - o 14 days after their last exposure.
 - Get tested for COVID-19 If test results are negative employee can return to work and if test results are positive employee follows the procedures above.
 - o If vaccinated-After 3 days get tested and return to work.
- 5. An employee that has a contact with a person (has no symptoms) who had contact with a person who has tested for COVID-19 or has symptoms, this is not considered an exposure. This is considered a contact of a contact or a third party exposure. The employee can return to work.

PAID QUARANTINE LEAVE POLICY (Law Enforcement)

Statement of Purpose/Applicability

Pursuant to Texas Local Government Code Section 180.008, the City of Los Fresnos hereby adopts this paid quarantine leave policy for peace officers who are employed by and ordered to quarantine or isolate due to a possible or known exposure to a communicable disease while on duty.

(Ref. Tex. Loc. Gov't Code 180.008(b).)

Definitions

- (1) "Health authority" means a physician appointed by Cameron County to administer state and local laws relating to public health within the city's jurisdiction.
- (2) "Paid quarantine leave" means: (1) all employment benefits and compensation, including leave accrual, pension benefits, and health benefit plan benefits provided by the city; and
- (3) if applicable, reimbursement for reasonable costs related to the quarantine, including lodging, medical, and transportation costs.
- (4) "Peace officer" means police officers licensed by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement and employed by the city
- (5) (Ref. Texas Local Gov't Code 180.008(a); 143.003(4)(A); Tex. Health & Safety Code 121.021; Tex. Code Crim. Pro. Art. 2.12.)

Quarantine Leave

A City of Los Fresnos peace officer who is ordered to quarantine or isolate by the person's supervisor or the health authority due to a possible or known exposure to a communicable disease while on duty is entitled to receive paid quarantine leave for the duration of the leave.

(Ref. Texas Local Gov't Code 180.008(c).)

No Reduction in Compensation and Benefits

The City of Los Fresnos will not reduce a peace officer's sick leave balance, vacation leave balance, holiday leave balance, or other paid leave balance in connection with paid quarantine leave taken in accordance with this policy.



The City of Los Fresnos Water Treatment Plant Expansion project requires the following revisions/modifications:

- The sludge removal system will function better by removing 2 actuator motors at the sludge clarifier effluent lines and a check valve at the lift station effluent line.
- In order to accommodate the existing filter tanks, components such as electric actuators for butterfly
 and telescoping valves, filter head and level transmitters, and SCADA software programming which
 will allow the plant operators to control the existing and new filters from the safety of the proposed
 chemical building.
- The layout for the chemical building was changed due to an 8" force main found on the east side of the building that needed to be relocated (See attached **Exhibit B**). The entrances to the chemical building which were originally on the East side have been relocated to the west side per the operator's request, and therefore the chemical dosing pumps and day tank locations have all been adjusted as well.

This change order also includes deductions to various items within the proposed chemical building. The plant operators expressed that they did not need a bathroom in the chemical building and so it has been removed along with the floor drain priming system. The wall between the SCADA Room and Laboratory Room has been removed as well and the CMU wall between the Laboratory Room and Chemical storage/feed room has also been adjusted to make extra space for the chemical storage area. Two emergency showers originally located in the Laboratory Room and Chlorine Room were also removed due to the electrical equipment present, and one shower in the Chlorine Room which has been removed to eliminate redundancy. The VFDs, which were originally going to be used for the high service distribution pumps, have also been removed and replaced with NEMA Starters to eliminate redundancy as well. The proposed HVAC system has also been modified from a central system to Mini-splits. The proposed Chemical Building will also be using the existing overhead service instead of a proposed transformer and pad thus eliminating this cost.



SECTION 5. That the City Secretary is hereby directed to file with the County Clerk and other appropriate officials and agencies, as required by state and federal law and city disannexation procedures, certified copies of this Ordinance.

SECTION 6. This Ordinance shall become effective upon passage and publication of the caption of this ordinance as required by the City Charter and State law.





BUILDING INSPECTION

Existing Services: Minimal services provide by Cameron County

Services to be Provided: Building Inspection will be provided by the City of Los Fresnos upon annexation. This includes issuing building, electrical and plumbing permits for any new construction and all remodeling activities as well as enforcing all other applicable codes which regulate building construction within the City of Los Fresnos. This also includes set back, parking and sign requirements. The current city staff is adequate to cover these services.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

Existing Services: Emergency medical services are provided by the Los Fresnos Ambulance Service through the Cameron County Emergency Services District.

Services to be Provided: The Los Fresnos Ambulance Service currently provides emergency medical services to the City of Los Fresnos. The Los Fresnos Ambulance Service will continue to provide emergency medical services to the area upon annexation. Current contract amounts are sufficient at this time. Adjustments will be made to funding in future years as needed. The Los Fresnos Ambulance Service has more than adequate equipment and personnel to serve the area.

ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES/CODE ENFORCEMENT/HEALTH

Existing Services: Minimal services through Cameron County Health Department

Services to be Provided: Environmental services will be provided by the Los Fresnos Police Department upon annexation. Some of the items included are weeded or rubbish lots, abandoned or junked vehicles, animal control, garage sales, loud music, food service permitting and health regulations. This also includes the regulation of certain types of businesses. The City provides regular mosquito control as needed. The current city staff is adequate to cover these services.

FIRE

Existing Services: Fire services are provided by the Los Fresnos Volunteer Fire Department through the Cameron County Emergency Services District.

Services to be Provided: The Los Fresnos Volunteer Fire Department currently provides fire services to the City of Los Fresnos. The Los Fresnos Volunteer Fire Department will continue to provide fire services to the area upon annexation. Current contract amounts are sufficient at this time. Adjustments will be made to funding in future years as needed. The Los Fresnos Volunteer Fire Department has more than adequate equipment and personnel to serve the area.

LIBRARY

Existing Services: None

Services to be Provided: The Ethel L. Whipple Memorial Library will provide free library services to anyone residing in the area upon annexation. Some of these services include books, E books, DVD's, internet access and reading programs. Other services that require fees are faxes, copies and computer print outs. These services can be provided within the current budget appropriation.

PLANNING AND ZONING

Existing Services: None

Services to be Provided: The Planning and Zoning Commission's responsibility for regulating development and land use through the administration of the City of Los Fresnos Zoning Ordinance will extend to this area upon annexation. The property will also continue to be regulated under the requirements of the City of Los Fresnos Subdivision Ordinance. These services can be provided within the current budget.

POLICE

Existing Services: Cameron County Sheriff's Department

Services to be Provided: The City of Los Fresnos will extend regular and routine patrols as well as investigative services to the area upon annexation. The Command Staff, Investigative Services, Communications Staff as well as the Patrol Division are adequate to serve the annexed area. As population increases so will staff.

SANITARY SEWER SERVICE

Existing Services: None

Services to be Provided: Sanitary sewer service to the area of proposed annexation will be provided by the entity that holds the CCN (Certificate of Convenience & Necessity). The City of Los Fresnos holds the CCN in this area. The service will be provided in accordance with applicable codes and departmental policy. When additional property develops in the adjacent areas, sanitary sewer service shall be provided in accordance with the present extension ordinance. Extension of service shall comply with applicable codes and ordinances. Developer will fund all sewer services to serve this area.

SOLID WASTE SERVICES

Existing Services: Allied Waste provides solid waste services to the unincorporated areas of Cameron County.

Services to be Provided: The City of Los Fresnos will provide solid waste services to the area upon annexation through its existing contract with Allied Waste. Service shall comply with existing City policies, beginning with occupancy of structures. Customers with existing contracts will be allowed to continue with their current contract and service until each contract expires. Allied Waste, in negotiation with the City of Los Fresnos will determine the collection days. Billing will be by the City of Los Fresnos, Allied Waste or a third party.

STORM WATER MANAGEMENT

Existing Services: Cameron County Drainage District Number 1 provides storm water management within the area.

Services to be Provided: Cameron County Drainage District Number 1 will continue to provide storm water management along with the City of Los Fresnos upon annexation. Developers will provide storm water drainage at their own expense and will be inspected by the Engineers of the Drainage District and the City at the time of completion. Depending on each instance, the Drainage District or the City will maintain the drainage.

STREET

Existing Services: Texas Department of Transportation & Privately Owned.

Consideration and ACTION to provide special funding for Los Fresnos Ambulance Service.

COVID impacted businesses, individuals, and governments. The Federal Government provided special funding. The City will receive just under \$2,000,000. During discussions with the Council on the use of COVID relief funds the City will receive, the Los Fresnos Ambulance Service presented a need for \$150,000 to upgrade the cab & chassis of one of their units. The Council approved to dedicate all of the funds for water and sewer upgrades but asked me to look in to other ways to provide this one time funding to Los Fresnos Ambulance Service. Our Fund Balance (Rainy Day fund or emergency fund) grew again this year to \$2,091,887. This amounts to 47.7% of our budget or 174 days of expenditures in case of emergency. Our goal is to have 90 days or about \$1,082,070. We have budgeted wisely thus opening up a way for this to be funded. If we fund this we will still have a Fund Balance (Rainy Day fund or emergency fund) of \$1,941,887, enough to cover emergency expenses for 161 days. This still leaves plenty for other uses and for an emergency if needed.

I recommend approval.

Consideration and ACTION to approve funding for 2021 Street Improvements.

In the last part of 2021, the Council authorized Hanson Professional Services to work on a bid package for streets that were discussed that need repairs. The attachment shows the streets that the Council approved. The Yellow ones will be funded by the City in the amount of \$698,108.63 not including the engineering and surveying of approximately \$100,000. The City currently has a fund balance (rainy day emergency fund) of \$2,091,887. That amount is 47.7% of the budget or enough to cover expenses for 174 days. If the Council approves the one time funding of \$150,000 for LF Ambulance Service, it will leave \$1,941,887. The proposed street repairs will cost \$698,108.63. This would still leave a fund balance for emergencies of \$1,243,778 or enough for 103 days which exceeds our goal of having at least 90 days available for emergencies.

There are 3 blocks that are directly connected to businesses or the flow around the businesses. Those are indicated in blue. This amount is \$173,105.38. The CDC will consider funding these streets. They have the funds available. Currently the CDC has a Fund Balance (Rainy Day or Emergency) of \$373,525. Additionally, the current CDC budget has \$232,000 available in special projects that is not committed to other projects.

The base bid will be the combination of the streets indicated in yellow and blue. We will include additive bids for the other 4 streets with the hope that bids come in lower than expected and we will be able to include some of those.

I recommend approval to proceed with getting bids as indicated on the 2021 Street Priority List.

Discussion and possible ACTION to determine actions to take on Escalante Road.


I was tasked to research Escalante Road. It is not an official road with right-of-way or easements for the road to be there. It is there by prescriptive easement. A prescriptive easement allows someone other that the original property owner to gain the rights to use a property. The land must be open and used on a continual bases for an uninterrupted period of at least five (5) years. The property has been used as a road for many years. Attached is a copy of the land owners for the road. I need direction on what further action to take. Here are some options.

- 1. Get the current owners to dead the property over to the city and have it paved. The problem with this is that some areas only have about 17 feet of available road right-of-way which is not sufficient for a normal road. This would only take care of about half of the road since most of the road is in the county, outside of the city limits. Also, one of the property owners (Escalante) would rather the road not come into the areas that are not wide enough.
- 2. Get with the property owners on the entire road, including the county to determine the owners of the land where the road is. Also, negotiate with the adjoining property owner to see if we can work a deal to put a proper road leading out another direction more than likely to Whipple Road.
- 3. Do nothing as far as right-of-way and have the existing road re-paved but only in the city limits.

Comments have been made that since the City annexed part of the road it is our responsibility to do what is necessary to resolve the situation since they are now city taxpayers. That is not true. The City is not responsible to fix a private road that has always been a private road. Technically it is the responsibility of the land owners to give the right-of-way needed, have it paved to city standards and then turn it over to the city for ownership and maintenance from that point on. This is well established standards in cities as well as the county. When we annexed this area it also included Longhorn Lane off of Highway 100. At the time we annexed it, it was an official county road with the right-of-way so Longhorn Lane became the property of the City making it our responsibility to maintain. It was in really bad shape so we fixed it and it is very nice now. Escalante Road is not the same since it doesn't have right-of-way for the road and the process of it being assumed by the county or city has never been done. However, there is nothing preventing the city from making the decision to fix it correctly. It just opens up the possibility of other type of roads being forced to do the same thing. One road in particular that is the same is Tandy Road. We do not maintain that since there is no right-of-way. The owners have to do that. This came to the council a few years ago. The only difference is the owners were not all unanimous in wanting the city to take it over. It was only about a 50/50 split. It seems 100% of the property owners on Escalante Road want it fixed.

- A. WWTP Headworks Construction continues. There are some parts back ordered on the final part of the project but are hopeful we can be complete in the next month. Remember we already completed the Chlorine Contact Basin that was combined with this project. These funds were part of a \$4,750,000 zero interest loan we received for this type of improvements over 10 years ago. Once we complete this part of the project we should have some remaining funds to utilize on another project. We will bring that to the Council for approval at the proper time..
- B. WW Collection System & Upgrade The city received a loan for \$1,600,000 to fix 1 lift stations (Cuates), run sewer service to the new annexed areas on West Highway 100 and up to Escalante Road, replace some old manholes and replace some old sewer lines. The bids came in too high so we got permission to only do the sewer service to the new annexed areas on West Highway 100 and up to Escalante Road. We will have the Cuates lift station as an alternate. This was approved and we are advertising for bids. We should have them ready for your approval at the April meeing. The repairing of the manholes and the replacement of the sewer lines will have to be moved to the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund. Once we have the water tank project bid we can go out for bids on this.
- C. WTP Expansion The city received a loan for \$3,700,000 for the water plant expansion and upgrade. Work has started and moving along. This upgrades the water plant capacity from 1,000,000 gallons per day to 1,500, 000 gallons per day. It also updates the plant from the 1950's to today in order to meet current regulations and technology. This is a 2 year project ending in June of 2023. The contractor wants to finish in a year and a half.
- D. Hike & Bike Trails The section from the Nature Park to Highway 100 is paved. They are getting it ready to get that part approved as final. They are working on the south side of Highway 100. Hopefully they can get it done in the next 2 months. The funding for this was a grant for approximately \$575,000 from the Valley Baptist Legacy Foundation, a \$200,000 grant from Texas Parks & Wildlife, from the CDC budget \$132,076.32 and from the City budget \$132,076.32.

We have committed to pay for the connection of our trail and the trail from Brownsville. This will be for the crossing of the drainage ditch only. The rest of the trail is funded by other

sources. The estimate for that project is \$129,483.75. It is not budgeted at this time but will need to be when Brownsville finishes the engineering design and we are ready to move forward. This could be several years.

- E. Henderson Road Resaca Crossings The contractor has said they are complete. The engineer will be scheduling a final walk through to see if there are any pending items. Once that is done and all items are complete we can officially close out the project.
- F. Drainage GREAT NEWS!! We were notified we will get \$843,704 in loan forgiveness which means a grant, free money. We were also notifid we will receive a zero percent interest loan for \$860,000 for the rest of the project. This will only require a debt payment of \$45,000 which we can work into the budget witthout any increases in taxes. This will be for drainage of Resaca Escondida (south of Nature Park), drainage improvements along Whipple Road and Valle Alto Subdivision and ditches to Highway 100 and a city wide drainage study and plan. We hope to get funded in the next 6 months.

The drainage pipe under the railroad north of Henderson Road is collapsed. I have contacted the UP Railroad to fix it. They are looking into the situation. I contact them about every 2 weeks to remind them and check status but they don't mover very fast on projects. Since UP doesn't respond, I have begun to look at other alternatives. I have met with the Manager for CCID#6 and we can possibly drain another direction since they repaired their ditch and placed it underground. I will be meeting with CC Drainage District #4 to see if it is possible. No progress on this yet.

General drainage capacity requests continue to be made by us to Cameron County Drainage District #1 to stop the back up of drainage on Alvarez Court and East 10th, 9th and 8th Streets. Also we have identified the back up of water along Highway 100 near the Motel and just past the school to the west of FM 1575. Both are the responsibility of TxDot. They don't see it as a major issue so are not interested in doing anything. Another area of concern is south on California Road where the drainage ditches are not maintained by anyone.

I will get Scott Fry to present to the Council on drainage and how they calculate drainage for new developments.

G. Whipple Road - There is no further progress at this time. CCRMA and Halff Associates continue to work on the overall project of widening of Whipple Road. They have plans prepared at 90% complete. They will be finalizing the plans over the next several months. The plans call for 2 driving lanes of 12 feet each, a center turn lane 14 feet wide and a 5 foot sidewalk on the south side. I have requested to have a sidewalk on the north side as well. There is \$4,820,000 for preliminary engineering and construction costs. We will have to locate funds for final engineering and any construction costs over the available amount. Once we have the preliminary engineering completed and an estimate done, we will be able to know the amounts of shortfall in funding there is.

- H. COVID-19 The total amount is of funds that we will be receiving \$1,941,898.48. We have received 50% or \$970,949.24. We will receive the other 50% next August or September of 2022. The approval was given in September on the year 1 funds. I have our engineers working on each one. As we get the proposals they will be brought to you and sent for approval of the project by the state and federal representatives. The projects for the first year include replacing the water ground storage tank for approximately \$173,000 (this will bid in March and hopefully award a bid in April), the Whipple Sewer Extension for \$257,050 and the Sewer line replacement for \$507,500.
- I. TxDot Highway 100 They promised to have the intersection open fully prior to the Rodeo to help with traffic flow and were successful in making that happen. They are working on the entire length of the project on the north side. This reduces the traffic flow through the city to 1 lane each way which will be a problem at times. However, the intersection is now fully open and traffic flow in pretty good. TxDot is working on the specific requirements on their part to add the right turn lanes from FM 1847 to Highway 100.
- J. Stanford Road & FM 1575 Drainage TxDot did the drainage work on their ditches along the road but they still did not do it properly so the water will flow properly. The County still has not done their on Stanford Road. They say they will do the north side once the contractor has done the south side. I am working with the contractor on the south side to hopefully get it done correctly..
- K. East 10th & East 5th Street Sewer During heavy rains sewer backs up out of the manholes and into a couple of homes (not always liquid but smell). We have discovered a large plug in lines down stream and fixed. We have ordered 2-25 horse power pumps to replace 2-20 horse power pumps at the Alamo Lift Station to hopefully solve some of the problem. We will be able to pump an additional 1,000 to 2,000 gallons per minute. Both of the pumps are now installed. Additionally the fixing of manholes and sewer lines in other projects should help solve the problem. If not we can reroute the sewer in the 10th Street area for approximately \$325,275 and in the 5th Street area for \$101,750.
- L. Projects Discussed But Not Funded LF Ambulance Service \$150,000 is on this agenda; Sewer Manhole Replacement \$1,000,000; Sewer Line Replacement \$1,813,500.
- M. Street Repairs The estimated costs are on the agenda. These funds will come from the existing budgets, CDC and our fund balance (rainy day fund). The streets include: Nogal from 1847 to 3rd; Alamo from 1847 to Canal; 1st from 1847 to Brazil; 3rd from 1847 to Brazil; Coma from 100 to 2nd; 2nd from 1847 to Pita; 8th from 1847 to Alamo; 8th from Olmo to Nogal; 6th from 1847 to Brazil; 5th from 1847 to Brazil; Alamo from 5th to 8th; 7th from 1847 to Piat; 6th from Como to Ebano; 9th from Olmo to Mesquite. Once approved we will go for bids.

Other streets in need of repair but not funded include: Canal from 1847 to Mesquite; Mesquite from 100 to Canal; 1st from Nogal to the cludedac; 2nd from 1847 to Alamo; Ebano from 100 to

3rd; 7th from Palma to Fresno; Nogal from 10th to the shooting range. The estimate for these street repairs is about \$700,000.

N. Escalante Road - It is currently a private road with no existing right-of-way. The Council authorized me to patch the road and then see who owns what and if anything could be worked out to gain access to the right-of-way and make it a city maintained street. I have met with the adjoining property owner to see if there were any options that may benefit them and the city but they are considering and getting with their engineer.
